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CWT Meeting at New Location March 22

The March meeting will be held at the Arlington Heights Senior Center on Monday, March 22, 2010. Note that this is the 4th Monday of the month. Kris Southerland's Demo at the January 12 CWT Meeting

I love mad scientists and am always sad to see them get their cosmic comeuppance at the end of movies. Dr. Frankenstein, Lex Luthor, and Frank n Furter (two points if you remember him) are some of my favorites.

Kris Southerland gave us all a way to get in touch with our inner mad scientist during January's CWT meeting. Kris gave us a stunning demonstration on custom cast pen blanks, and yes, they can be made in the comfort of your very own laboratory....I mean shop. Before you can cast

pen blanks, you need a mold. Dow Corning provides a silicone rubber casting material sold as Selastic M-2. It's blue, holds up very well, and has a tensile strength of 650 psi. ("My University colleagues laughed at my methods, but

they will laugh no more.") Kris uses a one inch square steel bar in the mold for a flawless negative space. After about eight hours of set up time, remove the steel bar and get ready to use your mold. (cont. on pg. 6)

The new location in Libertyville opens on March 10. Woodcraft will continue their woodworking and turning classes at the new store. Visit their website for the latest schedule.

He informed me that he has made a business decision to close the Palatine store and move it to a smaller venue in Libertyville, Illinois. His lease will expire on March 15th, but he will be moving the first weekend in March. Ron made this decision to downsize. based on the current economic situation and the excessive costs in doing business in Cook County. Since Woodcraft has been letting the Chicago Woodturners meet in the basement of this facility for the last 12 years, we will have to start looking for another place to meet. Our relationship with Woodcraft has been a mutually successful effort and we sincerely appreciate the support that Ron and his team have given us. We wish them the best and will be visiting them soon in Libertyville.

Members who attended last month's club meeting were notified that the Palatine store was closing and that the Chicago Woodturners' Board of Directors would be meeting the following night to lay out a plan to locate a venue for our new location. As a result of that meeting we have formed a Search Committee to coordinate and implement this search. Sandy White sanfordd9@comcast.net was appointed Search Committee Chairperson, so if you have any suggestions please contact him. The other members on the committee are Andy Kuby, Don McCloskey and Paul Shotola. As you can see, I didn't ask for volunteers, I picked the very best people for the job at hand and they gracefully accepted.

Although the closing of the store has created a short term crisis, if we handle it properly, it could be a blessing in disguise. It can result in a stronger, more united club and perhaps a better location. Only time will tell. At least we will now be able to openly solicit special

deals from other vendors without jeopardizing our relationship with Woodcraft.

Since we have only one more meeting at Woodcraft, it is imperative that we get all of the media that has been checked out. back into the library by the next meeting. With that in mind. Rich gave us all the data needed to set up your jig, and most importantly, explained what each of these settings does to your tool. As soon as we are settled into a meeting new space, mentoring will resume. Jason Swanson is ready to show us how a wet wheel puts the edge on our tools. Stay tuned!

Now to make your custom cast pens you will need casting resin and a lightning storm. OK, the lightning storm is optional. Kris suggests Alumilite brand casting



The 2-color resin mix (www.alumilite.com) going into the mold


resin. Not only is it easily available, the web site is full of "How To" videos. Alumilite is a binary product that mixes 1:1 by volume or weight. Once the agents

are mixed they have a working life of about three minutes, so you must work fast.

The resin can be modified in almost limitless ways, but Kris suggests two categories. One is to add a strong dye to the resin agents before mixing. It really takes only a few drops to generate a strongly marbled pattern. This is a good opportunity to be creative. It's ALIVE! Well, maybe not, but it's certainly colored. Kris's other method is to put inclusions into the mixed resin. Coffee beans. split peas, retina pasta, whatever might look interesting turned.

Once the resin is mixed and color or inclusions added, the molds are treated with a mold release, or just a spot of The PAM. resin poured into the mold and put into a pressure pot at about 50 psi to eliminate bubbles. Where can you get a pressure pot? A good one will run about \$400. but Harbor Freight has one for about \$40. As usual when buying caveat emptor. tools. After about an hour. bleed the air from the pressure pot, tap out your finished casting and make that custom pen bound to impress all other mad scientists.

If you would like to just grab your lab coat and try this method, the Hobby Lobby web site

offers an Alumilite mini casting kit for \$29.99. The kit includes the molding and casting materials, along with some paper cups and stirring sticks. Hey, it's cheaper than the pressure pot. Other materials can be ordered from BJB Plastics, Smooth-On, and Allumilite.

January Meeting Minutes

The meeting was opened shortly after seven PM by President Phil Brooks with the standard disclaimers about safety and exits.

Many of the members were fashionably outfitted with red name tags and a large number of them immediately saw Al Miotke to pay their 2010 dues and get the stain removed. Phil pointed out that 60% of the members are also members of The American Association of Woodturners (AAW) and encouraged the remainder to get on board. We should all be supporting the national organization.

Indigo Jazz, the Palatine High School group that performed for us at the Christmas meeting, was invited to perform at the White House on Dec. 21. CWT board members found out that some of the kids might not be able to go because they could not afford it, so CWT sponsored one of the performers for that trip.

Paul Shotola, the publicity chair for the upcoming Symposium, gave a vocabulary lesson on the meaning of Symposium. Much to the disappointment of the audience, it appears that the preferred definition will not be "a drinking party as in ancient Greece" but rather "a meeting or conference for discussion of a topic, especially one in which the participants form an audience and make presentations." Paul presented a brief description of the symposium location and the line-up of demonstrators, hands-on activities and trade show. Jan Shotola opened the registration for the Symposium and described the meals and accommodations available. The registration is open to CWT members only for a limited time and the word is that the Ohio Valley club plans to take all the spaces we don't. Sign up for August 20-22. Refer to

The big news, though, was the closing of the Palatine Woodcraft store on March 1, 2010. The Chicago Woodturners have benefited from a symbiotic relationship with Woodcraft for over ten years and it will be difficult, if not impossible, to replicate the space. Woodcraft has been very good for us through the years and we wish them well in their new location in Libertyville (which unfortunately does not have a 10.000 square foot basement). Please continue to shop Woodcraft for your tool urges.

Because of the pending closing of Woodcraft, there was a discussion of possible new venues and different courses of action the club could take. All members should take this opportunity to think about what they would like the club to be doing differently, and where, and communicate to the board of directors as soon as possible. (Board of Directors met the following night to appoint a search committee to coordinate the probable move to new quarters. Suggestions and rants should be directed to Sanford White (Chairman), Paul Shotola, Don McCloskey, or Andy Kuby, who form the committee.)

Treasurer Jan Shotola reported that the club has over \$28,000 currently in the bank (\$3,300 in a CD, \$7,500 in an Education Fund Savings Account and the balance in the checking account).

Membership Chair Al Miotke reported that we had over 90 members and guests attending, including Bill O'Conner from Burlington, WI and Jim Kingsley from Mt. Prospect, IL. Four new members signed up at the meeting: **Andy Kuby**

Kelly Bissell from Woods tock, IL, Darryl Descourovez from Twin Lakes, WI, Bruce Thompson from Mundelein, IL and Scott Nelson from Winfield, IL. Al continued to take in dues through the evening. Expect a much smaller number of red tags next month.

Librarian Clint Stevens and Tool Czar Don McCloskey presented a new DVD on Sharpening by Kirk DeHeer and the Ci3 Easy Finisher, with a replaceable carbide cutter. Both will be available in the library. Don also thanked the members again for the amazing turnout of bowls for the Empty Bowls Project and the over 200 pens for the Freedom Pens Project.

Larry Fabian announced that he has an inexpensive source (in Cedarburg, WI) for the minerals you will need to do Steven Hatcher type inlay. Please see Larry for additional information.

Scott Barrett and Chuck Svazas raffled off a few piles of wood, pen boxes and a Oneway sharpening jig to raise over \$200.

Sandy White reported that club members can get a 20% discount at Exotic Woods exoticwoodsusa.com through January, February and March using the discount code ChicagoWoodturners20.

Paul Pyrcik gave the gallery review, but only after a quiz on New Year's Resolutions that had everyone admitting that they coveted new tools and never had enough "good wood."



DVD Review: Sharpening Demystified by Kirk DeHeer

Don McCloskey



Kirk DeHeer has been teaching woodturners for many years at the Craft Supplies School in Utah. He shares his experience and techniques on the essential skills of sharpening in this new video. DeHeer covers the most common sharpening systems, freehand grinding, the Oneway Wolverine system with jigs. and the Tormek

wet sharpening systems. He covers the cutting edges and discusses sharpness vs. durability and grit vs. edge. Chapters on setting up the basic grinding system,

dressing the wheel, and setting the height of the grinder are included. Kirk also discusses various grinder accessories. Sharpening of all of the basic turning tools is covered, with clear explanations and sharp videography. While Kirk is a strong proponent of using jigs for sharpening, he covers freehand sharpening as well. There is

even a section dedicated to sharpening chain saws, with a strong emphasis on safety. If you wonder why sawyers wear those Kevlar chaps, Kirk graphically explains their value. Kirk also brings repeatability to sharpening edges to increase your turning time, not setup time, for sharpening. This is a must-have DVD that does de-mystify the sharpening process. This video is a true value at \$24.95 and can be purchased from Craft Supplies, Amazon or directly from Kirk at his website: kirkdeheer.com

Don Derry, Ellensburg, WA

Viewing the Instant Gallery at the AAW Symposium in 1994, Don asked himself "What do I not see represented in this exhibition?" The answer was vibrant color and quality finishing. Don set out to correct these omissions. His hollow forms are brilliantly colored, using dyes and paints, then finished with a gloss finish as perfect as possible.



Early in his turning career, he produced hundreds

of Christmas ornaments each year, and developed the tools and techniques to produce them efficiently. When you make 500 objects annually,

you will become proficient at the process.

Don will demonstrate not only his hollowing and finishing techniques, his demonstrations will help train your eye and your hands so you can produce graceful artworks, as well.

Don's hollowing tools and accessories are popular and designed for ease of use. Take the time to visit his Derry Tools booth in the Trade Show as well as enjoying his demonstrations.



More color, more texture, more imagination. David's signature "basket illusions" works are inspired by Native American woven baskets, but with a modern vibrancy and attention to detail. Using a variety of techniques to carve, burn and color his work, David pushes the boundaries of woodturning with every piece he produces.



David insists that "if you're not living on the edge, you're taking up too much room!" Recent work by David includes the use of the airbrush to expand his ability to color and convey his concepts. Look for demonstrations on designing and producing basket illusions of your own.



As a special treat, David will partner with Cindy Drozda for a demonstration and discussion of "left brain/ right brain," a popular and enlightening event that is certain to entertain and inspire.
