### Demonstration Report

#### Paul Rosen

#### January Demonstration: Celtic Knot Pens



Our demonstrator for January was Master Chief Don McCloskey, US Navy, Retired. We know Don from his past presentation on the Celtic knot in 2015, as well as his earlier demo on open segmented turnings. In the case of the Celtic knot, turning is the easy part. The hard part is figuring out how to cut the blank. You start with a four-sided blank of light-colored hardwood, such as hard maple, about 6 inches long and 1 inch square. (You *could* knock the edges off each corner by ripping the blank at 45-degrees. This makes the blank an octagon, when viewed from the end. But for starters, it might be easier to stick with the four-sided blank.)



Don recommends using a sliding jig on your table saw or band saw. The table saw jig gives a smoother cut, but a thicker kerf. The table saw jig consists of a piece of <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>- or 3/4-inch plywood, about 24 inches on each side. On the bottom of the plywood, attach two runners that are 3/4 inch x 3/8-inch and slightly longer than 24 inches. You can purchase metal or plastic runners at Rockler or Woodcraft, or you can rip your own out of hardwood. If you make your own, the trick is to be dead accurate. You want the runners to fit precisely into the slots on your table saw, without any slop. The depth of the runner needs to be slightly less than the depth of the slot on the table saw. The critical distance is the width of the runner. You want it to be small enough to fit in the slot, so you can easily push the jig into the saw blade, but you want it to be thick enough so there is no left-to-right play in the slot. Once you glue and screw the runners into place on the back of the plywood jig, attach a thickness-planed 2 x 4 at the back end of the jig. Make certain that the  $2 \times 4$  is

set precisely perpendicular to your saw blade. That way, you can use the sled as a cutoff jig for squaring the ends of your turning stock. Once the  $2 \times 4$  is secured to the plywood, make a test cut. (Tip: Don't raise the saw blade higher than the height of the  $2 \times 4$ ; you don't want to cut the back stop in half.)

Next, you need to install an arm on the top surface of the plywood, so you can set the desired cutting angle, which is about 40-degrees for the Celtic knot. The arm can consist of a piece of 3/4-inch stock. You will also need to devise a stop along the edge of the arm. The stop is necessary because you will cut the pen blank four different times, and you want to start the cut at the same point along the blank for each cut.

With the sliding jig, angle arm, and stop completed, you're ready to make your first cut. You could cut completely through the pen blank, but Don likes to leave a 1/32-inch "hinge," which makes it easier to maintain the alignment on the pen blank. But this raises the question of how thick the piece of contrasting wood should be. The answer: the same width as the size of your saw kerf. (Measure carefully, with a micrometer.) Once the first cut is made, Don uses cyanoacrylate glue (medium) or epoxy to secure the darker wood precisely into the kerf on the cut pen blank. Let the glue dry, and then make the second cut, 180-degrees opposite the first cut. Cut the contrasting dark wood to size, and glue to the two cut surfaces as before. Repeat the process for cuts 3 and 4.

For aesthetic reasons, you may want a saw kerf less than 1/8-inch. You could use a "thin kerf" saw blade on the table saw. Alternately, you could build a sliding jig for your bandsaw. That might be easier, as the

bandsaw needs only one runner. Don uses a 5/8-inch wide bandsaw blade, which should leave a kerf somewhat thinner than even the thin-kerf table-saw blade. In any case, the thickness of the darker, hardwood insert must match the thickness of the saw kerf.



parallel, rope-like patterns on the pen barrel.

With the glue-up on the square turning blank completed, you can now bore a hole precisely centered on your blank, using the drill bit diameter recommended for use with the cylindrical brass inserts specifically sized to fit your pen kit. Slightly scratch the outside surface of your brass inserts with sandpaper, and glue the insert into place on the pen blank. Trim the ends to length, and then insert the blank into your lathe and turn to a cylinder of desired thickness. The Celtic knot should appear as a pair of

I have just described how to make four cuts on the pen blank. Don has taken the process even further by starting with the four-sided blank and then ripping off the corners. This results in an 8-sided blank. So the number of cuts on the table saw (or band saw) now doubles, from four to eight. The final result is a Celtic knot which condenses the rope-pattern by a factor of two - that's if you want to go through the work of making eight cuts and glue-ups. For additional information on how to do the Celtic knot, please see the PowerPoint presentation posted on the CWT website.

Don has spent 26+ years in the US Navy, working as an electrician. He also has given demonstrations on pen turning in the local craft stores. You might also recognize Don as the guy who organizes CWT contributions to Pens for Troops and Empty Bowls during the holiday season. He might be retired, but he's still a busy guy, and a good guy to know. If you haven't met him yet, introduce yourself at one of the club meetings. He'll be glad to help you with any questions you might have on pen turning or open segmented turning.

This demonstration is designed to give you simple projects to get you out into the shop and sharpen your skills.



#### **Holiday Party**



### **Professional Demos for 2020**

Her work with plants also led to her interest in photography, initially because of the need to document her fieldwork, but more recently in exploring nature, landscapes, and people.


