AAW News

Sadly, we all knew this was coming...

AAW leadership has been closely monitoring the status of Covid-19 in preparation for our 35th Annual International Symposium, July 15-18, in Omaha, NE. Above all else, our concern continues to be the health and safety of our members, demonstrators, trade show vendors, partners, and other event attendees.

At its February meeting, the AAW Board of Directors unanimously made the essential decision to cancel the in-person 2021 AAW Symposium in Omaha. Based on research, risk assessment, and adherence to CDC guidelines, the Board has determined that holding a safe, high-quality, in-person event in July is not possible.

While we expected the Covid-19 pandemic to recede by July 2021, too many uncertain variables remain, including vaccine distribution and efficacy, and evolving virus variants. The Board concluded that even when

following CDC and local COVID-19 transmission precautions, we cannot guarantee safety for all involved given the large number of people assembling from around the country and the world.

While this is incredibly disappointing for all of us, we are moving ahead to create an improved AAW Virtual Symposium for 2021 and are actively planning our next in-person symposium for 2022. You can look forward to:

- AAW's 2021 Virtual Symposium, July 17-18, 2021, with front-row seats from home for your safety and comfort. We will be using an enhanced virtual event software platform to offer multiple concurrent live demonstration tracks (with access after the conference to all recordings), a virtual trade show, a virtual Instant Gallery, live and silent auctions, special interest topics, drawings, and more. The only thing missing will be the handshakes and hugs from old and new woodturning friends. You will need to wait one more year for that.
- An in-person AAW 36th Annual International Symposium, June 23-26, 2022, in Chattanooga, TN. This large, action-packed experience marks the celebrated comeback of AAW's Symposium after a two-year virus-related hiatus. There will be plenty of demonstrations and panel discussions, a jam-packed trade show with exhibitor booths, inspiring exhibitions and Instant Gallery, auctions of turned art, charitable initiatives, networking opportunities, and more. Mark your calendars!

Please know that that protecting the health and safety of our members is our single most important consideration. As we continue to address the challenges of Covid-19 and its impact, we thank you for your patience, understanding, flexibility, and support.

We offer our best wishes for health and safety to each of you and to those you care about.

Andy talked about the Beads of Courage program, introducing the new members and reminding all members of the worthiness of the program. Andy also announced that Don McCloskey is being honored with a lifetime membership for his long and active participation in CWT activities, particularly Pens for Troops, and his untiring contributions to the club success. Al Miotke virtually presented Don with a special plaque for all the years he has devoted to CWT.

Membership

Brenda Miotke reported that the current membership is 151, and that 63 members have already renewed their membership with most of the rest in the process of renewing. Mike Canfield, our new treasurer, is working out a new method to pay dues on-line, and should have details nailed down shortly. Brenda welcomed two new members. Safety

This evening's Safety Report was the tag team of Frank Pagura and Al Miotke. Frank indicated that one of the major concerns is still the quality of the air we breathe in our shops, and indicated that any improvement or upgrade to better clean up the air can be a benefit to our heath. With that, he turned the presentation over to Al Miotke, who has just completed a major upgrade of his shop dust collection. With the aid of photos Al described the extent of his work, which included a complete network of 4" air ducts with attachment to each of his machines. He installed a new Oneida Supercell, built a room around it and padded the walls with carpet underlayment to keep the noise at a comfortable level. All and all, this is the kind of upgrade which should be one of our bucket list items.

Demonstration Report

Woodturning Collection Tour

Our presenter, for the 11th consecutive online virtual CWT meeting, was Dawn Herndon-Charles. Dawn and I have been members of CWT for over a decade. So for me, her PowerPoint presentation was like a trip down memory lane, as many of the pieces in her collection were from professional turners whom I had seen demonstrate for CWT. The difference is, while she and I saw the same demos, Dawn was interfacing more closely with the demonstrators, often acquiring some of their pieces. Furthermore, Dawn would frequently take classes with these turners, which significantly advanced her turning learning curve, as well as her appreciation for some of the subtle features of their work.

The photos in her presentation were excellent. Dawn has the keen eye of an artist. She generously credited her photos to assistance from both Marie Anderson and Dave Bertaud. But she firmly believes in the artist's axiom, "form is everything." And you could see how she followed that axiom as she presented the pieces from her collection. Long-time members of CWT will recall Carole Floate, who once gave a demo on applying marbling colors to her turned platters. That was Dawn's first turning class, taken at the Woodcraft store in Woodridge. Dawn also obtained a pocket watch with inlaid circles on the back, turned by Dick Sing. In fact, Dick was one of the turners whose work inspired Dawn to join CWT.

The late Ray Key is well known in British woodturning circles, as he was instrumental in promoting woodturning as a craft, and elevating its practitioners into formal organizations in England. He is most noted for his lidded boxes made from South American hardwoods. Key would purchase an entire tree, import it to England, and then give specific instructions to his sawyer on exactly how he wanted parts of the trunk to be cut. Dawn showed us her Bowler Hat box that Key had turned in cocobolo. While he left us in 2018, Ray did leave us with three excellent books on woodturning (check out amazon.com).

Dawn showed us a lidded box turned by Alan Lacer of Minnesota, who is noted for his mastery and advocacy of the skew chisel. Lacer and his wife, Mary, have been active in AAW for years, and he has produced an excellent instructional video entitled, "The Taming of the Skew." Lacer at a CWT demo in the basement of the Woodcraft store also showed us how to make and use a hook tool for hollowing out boxes turned between centers. Dawn showed us three lovely, lidded, boxes turned from a cherry burl.



Hans Weissflog, the box turner from Germany, once visited CWT to give a demo showing how he made his signature, twice-turned box tops, with see-through grooves turned eccentrically. Scott Barrett recently duplicated this idea using his Rose Engine lathe, in a collaborative piece he made with Al Miotke, who made the segmented base of the box. Hans has turned innovative sphere-within-a-sphere pieces, as well as spherical boxes. Dawn showed us some of Weissflog's seemingly impossible-to-turn pieces from her collection.

From a Molly Winton demo, Dawn learned the value of a good, private critique. Winton feels that this helped her improve the quality of her turnings to elevate them from "just good" to gallery quality. The value and benefits of galleries cannot be overstated. Woodturners not only keep galleries in business, but they also help to elevate the value of woodturning as an art form.



Roberto Ferrer is a local turner/artist with a growing national reputation. We are fortunate to have him as a member of CWT, not only as a teacher/demonstrator, but also as a creative spirit whose sculptured turnings and surface embellishments are pushing the boundaries of conventional woodturning. He is also very active in social media. You can see his work on

both Facebook and Instagram, with new examples appearing on an almost weekly basis. Dawn showed us images of a textured bowl by Roberto, contributed for Turn-On Chicago! (2016) from her collection.



Dawn first saw Keith Holt at an AAW meeting in Kansas City. She showed us his Singing Trio of Spheres which she purchased from a private gallery. The spheres were done as offset turnings, with unique smiles on each facial form. For Dawn, the trio elicits a visceral response and always makes her smile when she looks at them. I agree. They do have personality.

Graeme Priddle and Melissa Engle are a highly creative pair of turners who recently demonstrated at CWT. Surface embellishment is their specialty, using woodburning techniques with the addition of color from milk paint. Dawn showed us her wide-rimmed bowl with a central depression that contained an expanding spiral of petals in the center, as well as a blue, textured egg, about 1-1/2 x 2-inches, supported on a black stand. Priddle, who is originally from New Zealand, once worked as a telephone technician there, where he developed a strong knowledge of electronics that helped him devise his own designs for woodburning tools, which are available from his website. Melissa grew up as an artist in the Pacific Northwest; the pair have now taken up residence in Asheville, North Carolina.



Dawn also showed us some of her three-sided cherry boxes, a technique she first learned from a demo given by Jason Clark, and later inspired by designs from Graeme Priddle and Melissa Engler. A third box contained surface embellishments Dawn learned from Andi Wolfe. If you think you might want to turn this type of box, check out the recent "how to" article in *American Woodturner* by CWT president, Andy Kuby. It's on pages 22 to 25 of the February, 2021 issue.

Betty Scarpino turned some walnut nesting bowls that were later textured and bleached, and now reside in Dawn's collection. The last demo she gave prior to retiring from doing demonstrations was actually at CWT, which is where Dawn made her purchase. Long-time readers of *American Woodturner* might recognize Betty's name as a former editor of the magazine, and possibly the best at that job. Her contribution to woodturning was recently recognized by AAW with an honorary "Lifetime Membership Award."

Greg Gallegos turned a yew vessel in Dawn's collection. Greg is somewhat of a character. He likes to use "found" wood for his turnings and is known to go dumpster diving to find some of his raw materials.

He likes to dry his "finds" in a microwave oven. Dawn showed us a hollowed-out egg form with an extraordinarily lovely grain pattern, turned into a perfect shape. It was a classic example of "good form is everything" in woodturning.

Rudy Lopez turned a small, winged bowl in Dawn's collection. It's only 1/8-inch thick, and he gave it to Dawn as a gift when she drove him to the airport after a demo at Christian Liberty Academy. Rudy is an exceptionally multi-faceted guy. His initial education was in drafting and design, but he worked for years as a professional photographer. He also is an avid mountain biker and outdoorsman, having childhood roots at his uncle's cattle ranch in Florida, and a love of hiking in the woods. He produced fine furniture and cabinetry for years, so his transition to woodturning seemed like a natural evolution.

If you missed Dawn's presentation, and about 100 of our CWT members apparently did, you missed a good one. Comments like "Wonderful," "Very good job," and "Wish I had something half as good" (as her collection) came in at the end of her talk. At the end, Dawn said that she "enjoyed putting it together." Speaking for those of us who watched, thank you Dawn, for a job exceptionally well done.

Dawn would like to add

Thank you for letting me to share some of my collection virtually with you. Reluctant when approached, I am now so very grateful for the experience. After benefiting from other demonstrators for many many years, it was time to give back a little and in doing so I gained even more myself.

Putting the presentation together provided a reason to really look at works in my collection and just sit with them for a time; something I hadn't really done in while. Selecting pieces to include in the slides, I looked at them with a slightly more experienced eye and reflected on when, why and how I acquired a given work and what I appreciate most about it now. Each one has its own tale, some more involved than others. Some pieces have decent form, but are imbued with sentimental value owing to circumstances around the acquisition or relationship with maker or inspiration (a Cherry box I made after an especially fun class), some have wonderful form and composition (Keith Holt's Singing Trio) that would draw me in from across the room even if I didn't know the artist, and that rare combination where sheer artistry of the piece itself is enhanced by the story and a connection with the maker (Dick Sing's pocket watch from the AAW 2018 Symposium where I was the videographer for that very session).

So, I would ask each of you to look at one or two pieces in your own collections with fresh eyes. What story is behind the piece? Did you make it after an exciting demo, did you buy it to support a cause, trade with someone, or buy from a friend or artist because it was just beautiful? What drew you to the piece? I think it would be interesting to see and hear about some of the pieces which are special to other members.

The Bronzed Bowl demo will include the usual turning tips including bowl gouge grind use and presentation, work holding and form.

Nick will be adding texture to the surface using some found objects from around the home or shop as well as some "off the shelf" items. We will also look at two different ways of bronzing. One will be using reactive paints to get rust, copper and Bronze on some pre-made pieces.

For this demo Nick will be showing a more instant effect using verdigris and bronze Gilt alongside Air brushed wood dye application.
