Demonstration Report

Bob Shuford "Boids"



Our virtual demonstrator for the month of April, 2021, was Bob Shuford. In his online Powerpoint presentation, Bob showed us the history of turned birds originally designed in 1959 by Kristian Vedel (1923-2003). Vedel completed an apprenticeship as a Danish cabinetmaker in 1942, and four years later graduated from the Furniture Design Department at the School of Arts, Crafts, and Design in Copenhagen, Denmark. He became a lecturer at the same facility between 1953 and 1956, and later organized and became the first chair of the Industrial Designers of Denmark, from 1966 to 1968. And while he is remembered as an industrial designer of children's furniture during the Danish Modern era of the 1950s, his turned birds may be his most popular legacy. He was only 36 when he designed them. There were three generations: child,

parent, and grandparent. They are still made by a small firm in Denmark and are available online in both natural oak and smoked oak (darker version), at rather handsome prices. Fortunately, the birds are fairly simple to make, with a few key tricks shown to us by Bob.

The eyes give the birds their sparkling personalities. They evoke emotions of happiness, sadness, curiosity, and even can serve as an overnight ring stand. They make great company, never complain, and often make your house guests smile and want to play with them. A YouTube video by Mike Peace shows the details on how to make these birds, and Michael Hamilton-Clark has authored an AAW article on them called "Wazzos."



Bob starts with a 1 x 1 x 12 piece of holly (for the whites of the eyes) from Craft Supplies, which he cuts into three 4-inch lengths. He uses a 1/2-inch brad-point bit on the lathe to bore a hole through the center of the holly. (Note: from personal experience, hard maple can serve as an alternative to holly.)

For the dark portion of the eye, Bob

used ebony, but purpleheart, paduak, or walnut would also work. Bob used a 5/8-inch square x 4-inch-long piece of ebony, turned to a final diameter of 1/2-inch. Size the dowel using an open-end, 1/2-inch wrench. Trick No. 1: As shown in the Mike Peace video, turn a short (1/2-inch long) spacer for the tailstock end of the 4-inch blank, so the point on the tailstock drive does not open a crack at the end of the ebony blank. (Don't ask how I know this.) Alternately, don't use a spacer. But leave 1/4-inch at each end of the 5/8inch blank unturned until you can amputate each end



on a chop saw. Eventually, you will need to insert the 1/2-inch diameter turned ebony into the hole you made in the holly.

If the ebony is too fat to fit the drilled hole, you can try placing it into a drill chuck and use coarse sandpaper to reduce its diameter. But this process is slow and may require repeated re-mounting/sanding. It's actually faster to re-mount the ebony between centers and make a couple of light passes with a skew chisel. But re-mounting can be tricky if the mount isn't centered, so consider re-mounting using a Jacobs chuck to hold the ebony. Use the skew chisel just past the half-way mark on the ebony, and then reverse it in the chuck to complete the cutting. Once the ebony slides easily into the holly, use Titebond glue to coat the ebony. Insert the ebony into the holly, and let dry overnight.

Eccentric Turning...



After squaring off the two ends of the eye blank, you will need to turn the glue-up between centers. Mark each end of the blank with an awl. This makes a mounting target for the drive center and the live center on the tailstock. Make your marks either slightly toward the dark wood or the light wood. Use the same offset on both ends of the blank. If you mark on the light wood side, the "white" of the eye will be larger. If you mark on the dark wood side, the pupil of the eye will be larger. Your choice. Bob turns the eye stalk to a final diameter of 3/8-inch. Use an open-end wrench as a

gauge (lathe off) as you approach the final diameter for the eye stalk. Measure repeatedly. Accuracy counts here, as the stalk must fit into a 3/8-inch hole you will later bore into the head blank using a Forstner bit.

Head Stock

The wood species for the head and body can be ash or white oak for a light color, or walnut if you prefer a darker hue. The white oak can also be turned dark, if desired, by smoking with ammonia vapors. Bob likes to start with a 5-inch blank that is 1-1/2-inches square. Mike Peace uses a 1-5/8-inch square. Again, your choice. Some like to use the smaller size for the child version while reserving the slightly larger head diameter for the parent and grandparent versions.



Mark the head blank for where you want the eye holes to go. I usually measure 2-5/16-inches as the distance from the tip of the beak to the center of the eye. Mark this point on two opposite sides of the blank where you want the eyes to go. Then measure in from each edge, so that the eye hole will be centered on the two opposing surfaces of the blank. Mark with an awl, and use a Forstner bit on your drill press to make a pair of 3/8-inch deep holes for your eye stalks. Glue in your eye stalks on each side, making sure that the "pupils" face in the same direction, approximately 45degrees up from the plane of the beak, and facing forward.

Let dry overnight, and then cut off the eye stalks at the surface of the rectangular blank using a handsaw or

bandsaw. A table saw with a sliding sled also works, but your fingers are very close to the spinning blade, so it's not the safest way to do it.

Grasp the head blank in the jaws of your scroll chuck. The sphere for the head will be on the right, with the beak pointing toward the left. Turn the blank to a cylinder, and then fashion a sphere on the right-hand end. Trick No. 2: the "No Trespassing" sign. This trick I learned from Mark Sfirri. He bought a yellow plastic "No Trespassing" sign and cut it into 3-inch squares. With the final diameter of the head blank

cylinder established, you press the plastic 3x3 into the turning cylinder. Friction will start to melt the plastic as you hold it perpendicular to the spinning cylinder. In less than a minute, you should be able to fashion a half-circle out of the plastic. This is a jig. As you sculpt the right-hand end of the head blank into a sphere, use the jig to see where the high or low spots are. Trim as required, and then remove any remaining tool marks with a negative rake scraper. Sand the sphere down to 400grit sandpaper, and apply finish to the sphere. Bob likes to use Danish Oil, which is then buffed. I like to use three consecutive coats of Myland's friction finish. Finally, turn the beak. The beak tapers from an initial diameter of 7/16-inch down to a point, with a length of between $1 \frac{1}{2}$, to $1 \frac{3}{4}$ inch



down to a point, with a length of between 1-1/2- to 1-3/4-inches. Bob likes to use a cylindrical blank on his tailstock with a 1-1/2-inch hemispherical concavity to match the diameter of the turned head. This helps to stabilize the piece as the beak is turned. After parting off, you might want to round over the tip with sandpaper, especially if young children will be handling it.

Turn the Body

The body of the child bird is about 3-inches long and 2- to 2-1/4-inches at its widest diameter. The widest diameter is about 3/4-inch from the tailstock end. The body is designed with a 7/8-inch concavity on both ends, so it is reversible. Girl birds are wider at the top; boy birds are wider at the bottom. (But you knew



that, right?!) Bob turns the body to its final diameter and then makes a tenon on each end. He then marks a 7/8-inch diameter circle using a compass on each end. These marks define the outer diameter of the concavity he will turn on each end. Once the two concavities are completed, Bob holds the body with a domed insert for the headstock and a domed tailstock insert, which provide enough of a friction fit for him to shape the final contours on the body. After sanding through the grits and application of the Danish Oil, a final buffing completes the project.

If you liked Bob's project, I would encourage you to go to

YouTube and perform some searches. There are some fascinating videos that show how the birds are still made today in a small Danish town using computerized machinery that guarantee perfect uniformity and consistency with Vedel's original designs. Search for "architectmade birds" or "Kristian Vedel birds." Mike Peace also has two turning videos on YouTube under the title, "Birds of a Feather."

This month's featured selection is a Natural Edge bowl by Tom Eovaldi. The Bradford Pear bowl had beautiful grain, well centered. While heavier than most natural edge pieces, the overall effect was good. The Osmo Polyx Oil finish suited the piece and continuing the finish up and over the bark increased the interest.

Meet the Woodturner, Brenda Miotke



Each month, the Newsletter will include a short interview to introduce one of our members. Please reach out to whoever Brenda interviews to let them know you're glad they're in the club and follow up with any questions you might have about something Brenda missed. This month Brenda interviewed Sol Anfuso.

Sol has been a member of Chicago Woodturners since July 2016. He came to the 2016 Turn On! Chicago symposium on a one-day pass. That is all it took! We have to give Sol's son some of the credit as he was the one who suggested Sol attend the symposium. Sol purchased his first lathe from Jason Clark and began to make handles for all his tools. He slowly graduated to making small bowls.

Sol's love of wood started at a very early age in Italy. When at 9 years old, his dad brought him to a furniture maker friend so that he could help him. Sol apprenticed there for another 3 or 4 years.


