# Secretary's Report

#### July 14, 2020 Chicago Woodturners meeting:

The Demo was replaced by a Virtual tour of Al Miotke's Shop. The Gallery Review was given by Kurt Wolff-Klammer.

Andy started the meeting with discussion about the AAW Virtual Symposium. Everyone reported that the demos were well done and very professional. There were some comments that additional time should be provided between the demos to get a drink or go the bathroom. The gallery reviews were interesting. The only area that had some technical glitches was the Auction. Al Miotke and Roberto Ferrer had pieces that did very well. Apparently the Symposium was a success, as it was attended by over three thousand participants.

Cancellation of live events and in person meetings continue, and virtual replacements are getting better and more are available. Windy City Wood Turners announced that Harvey Meyer will hold a virtual Demo on September 15, 2020 and invited CWT members to participate.

A Board Meeting was scheduled for July 23, 2020. On the agenda are several topics such as possible reopening dates for Chicago School of Woodworking participation in virtual demonstration, updating mentor roster and much more.

For the Safety presentation the Roughing Gouge Catches Video by Tim Yoder was included in the program. Dave Bertaud offered Winn Environmental as a good source for replacement filters and canisters for dust collectors.

The club received a request for carving some replacement parts to match a confessional if interested check with Andy.

Brenda announced we have a new member, Mario Cascone, he was recommended by Sol.

Group purchases for Walnut oil and Anchor Seal can be organized reach out to Al or Andy if in need.

#### July 23, 2020, Board of Directors Meeting:

The following was discussed:

- 1. The mentoring list on the website is outdated. Al Miotke will begin work on this. See first draft of updated list later in the newsletter
- 2. Windy City Will sponsor an Arbor Tech Demo which the Chicago Woodturners will participate in, details to follow
- 3. Windy City will host a live interactive demonstration by Harvey Meyer on September 15, 2020. The cost will be \$5 per person. Details to follow
- 4. Virtual Interactive Demonstrations. These were discussed at the July meeting as well. Overall the reception was favorable but the hands-on portion of our demonstrations would not be possible. The Board still thought it was worthwhile to pursue.
- 5. Resuming our in-person meetings was discusses. Based upon the restriction of in-person meetings to less than 50, and the possibility that other restrictions will be imposed as the second wave goes through the region, the Board assumed that in-person meetings will not be possible for the foreseeable future. January 2021 was discussed.
- 6. The Chicago School of Woodworking is open for classes, limited to less than ten including instructor. Chicago Woodturners Beginning Turning Classes may be scheduled for September 20 or 27 and October 18 or 25 if there is sufficient interest. Details to follow. A Waiver or Statement by attendees regarding exposure to Covid may be required.
- 7. There was a brief discussion of "adopting" a smaller regional club(s). No decisions were made, this will require additional research
- 8. The CWT insurance policies are still being reviewed. Al volunteered to contact other regional symposium to discuss
- 9. The CWT Summer Picnic and Holiday Party was discussed. It was agreed that these should both be cancelled for 2020.

# Demonstration Report

#### Al Miotke Shop Tour

For July, we were treated to a virtual shop tour by ex-CWT president, Al Miotke. We all know of Al's flawless segmented pieces from the galleries of past meetings, as well as his surface decoration techniques with a woodburner. This evening, we got invited to view his two workshops. The first had a SawStop table saw as its centerpiece, with a dozen hemispherical floodlights hanging from the ceiling. The walls of the workshop were populated with five or six individual workbenches, with natural light feeding in from windows at the second story level. Hidden from view was the pair of roller skates that Al would need to travel from one side of the shop to the other. Yeah, that's the shop we all dream of having one day.

But the *real* workshop on this virtual tour was Al's basement. It is actually a large, L-shaped space, part of which served as his home office prior to his retirement. Al learned woodworking from his father, who taught him to do a lot of flat work. To do that, you need things like a Delta table saw, band saw, jointer, router table, thickness planer, and of course, a work bench. A chop saw and disk sander were also present. Every segmented turner will need these. And of course, there was a sawdust scavenging system, which must work extremely well, as there was no sign of wood shavings or sawdust anywhere. Part of that is due to his ceiling-mounted air purifier. The HVAC has no exhaust, so no dust can gain access to other parts of his home.

For turning, Al has owned a Robust lathe for eight years. The lathe is mounted near the center of the room, so Al can move to the opposite side of the lathe when it's a more convenient position. Lathe tools are mounted on the wall behind the lathe, within easy reach. In fact, all of his tools were neatly mounted on peg-boards which spread over a broad area of his shop. That's a tribute to Al's organizational skills. I wish mine were as well positioned. Al also has a grinder, which he likes to use at a raised height, so he doesn't need to bend over when sharpening his gouges on his Oneway Wolverine grinding system. Good lighting is important when you do your work in a basement. To that end, Al decided to upgrade

from the dozen or so fluorescent lights he originally used to LED lighting. The upgrade occurred about a year and a half ago. "The LED lamps cost about \$8 to \$9.00 each," he said. But it was worth it. The 5000K (Daylight) color temperature of the lights made colors seem more natural, which is a plus when you're working with different stains and different wood species. And LEDs are "instant on," whereas the old fluorescent tubes would take time to "warm up, changing in color temperature over time."

Speaking of wood species, Al has built racks to accommodate a wide variety of turning stock. To keep track, Al labels each piece with the species name, so he can easily identify a piece when a project calls for it. Segmented turners always use a lot of glue, so Al has multiple containers stationed at strategic places, ready for use when the time for glue-ups occurs.

In the shorter "L-shaped" cove, where his home office once lived, Al has converted his desk space to a "sanding and carving" station. The generous shelving has space for all of his woodworking and turning books and magazines. For carving, Al has a Foredom (18,000rpm) for heavy duty stock removal. It has lots of power, but control? Not so much. He also has a 50,000 rpm micro-motor unit, which he uses for

most (80%) of his carvings. He also has an NSI, which gets used for perhaps 5% of the time. To capture all that small dust and smoke from the woodburner, Al has a small dust collector that sits on his desk. With a surface area of about 12 to 15 inches square, the dust collector includes a charcoal filter. Al estimates the dust collector is 20- to 30% efficient. He periodically blows dust off the filter using compressed air.

To protect his lungs, Al always wears an N95 mask in his shop. (N95 means the filter will capture 95% of the dust particles in the air. Someone mentioned that it is effective for blocking particles down to 3 microns.) Both Al and club Safety Officer, Frank Pagura, appreciate the value of wearing a mask, as it is the fine dust (the dust you can't see) that has the potential for causing pulmonary problems if you start to inhale it. (Personal aside: I was making a pair of dovetailed drawers out of poplar in my garage/shop, using a Keller jig to cut the pins and tails. I was preoccupied, setting up the proper height of the router bits to get a perfect fit, as I routed the pins and tails. I used a sawdust scavenging vacuum when routing the tails on the router table, but I decided to use a handscrew to clamp the tail boards vertically, and clamp the




Keller jig against said boards to route the pins. I routed all four ends, WITHOUT A MASK. I had pulmonary congestion within eight hours, and a classic chest cold/runny nose that's lasted for over a week. I think there is a lesson to be learned here. WEAR A MASK. I think I heard someone say it's patriotic.) Al also showed us an orange particle-counter he bought on Amazon. The orange Temtop brand measures



particles in two size ranges: PM2.5 and PM10. PM2.5 are the finer particles ranging in size from 2.5 microns and smaller. These are microscopic. You'll need an electron microscope to see them. You probably can't see them in the air, even with good LED lighting. The PM10 measures coarser particles between 2.5 and 10 microns. You get these larger particles from crushing or grinding operations, or from dust stirred up by vehicles on the road. The Temtop uses a laser

particle detector to make accurate determinations of particle size. They start at \$46.00 on Amazon. Or you can spend \$100.00 on the M2000 model with a TFT display that shows a graph of particle sizes measured over time. Amazon provides excellent tutorials on how these devices work.



Speaking of time, Frank stated that he has installed an exhaust fan in his basement window. Even when the visible dust has cleared, his particle counter says the dust is still there. In Frank's experience, it took 1.5 hours for the particle counter to confirm that the dust had cleared completely.

Finally, Al showed us his Delta overhead dust collector, mounted on his ceiling joists. It has replaceable filters, front and rear. The rear filter is washable, or you can take it outside and clear it with compressed air.

One more thing: Al has replaced the cloth bag on his main dust collector with an aftermarket substitute that is rated to prevent passage of dust particles larger than 1 micron. Granted, it is an expense. But when

you run your table saw in the basement, you really want to catch the sawdust coming off of that 10-inch blade at the source. If you don't, you'll be breathing it in, and possibly spreading it throughout the house when the gas house heater turns on.

During the July meeting our Safety Officer, Frank Pagura, presented a short video featuring Tim Yoder and the anatomy of a catch. With paintball armor and full tactical face-shield Tim was able to slow-motion closeups of the tool positioning leading to a catch. Everybody learned from this, even those of us who have never actually experienced a catch.

Frank's August presentation will deal with personal injuries.

#### Class for New Turners, now rescheduled

One of the special benefits of being a member of CWT is the annual class that is held for new turners. The goal of the class is to jump-start your progress as a woodturner by teaching you a wide variety of techniques, proper use of the various tools, keeping your tools sharp and, most important, lathe safety. This will be accomplished in a hands-on environment with multiple instructors guiding you through the day's projects.

The first class will focus on lathe basics and spindle turning. Being proficient with spindle turning is the cornerstone for all the other techniques you will learn. At the end of the day you will leave with a number of projects that you made during the day as you hone your skills. The second class will pick up where the spindle class ended, with focus on how to use a 4-jaw chuck, bowl turning and platter turning.

Each class is just \$60 and covers all the wood you will use - the best woodturning deal you will find. The day will begin at 9 am and end by 4:30. Everyone who signs up will have their own large format Jet or Powermatic lathe to use. If you don't



have all the basic turning tools yet, no problem, tools will be available and we can discuss what are the best tools for you to get.

# **CWT Virtual Meeting**

#### Things you might need to know for our Virtual Meetings

#### The Virtual Show and Tell Gallery

We suggest the members submit pictures of their pieces ahead of the meeting to use for the Show and Tell Gallery portion of the meeting. Several other clubs have switched to doing it this way and are happy with the results. A picture will have better lighting and orientation without it being too close or too far away from their webcam. Jerry Kuffel has spent time with Stephanie George from Florida learning a system she has developed using G-Suite apps to provide a link for the submission and then automatically generate a PowerPoint from those submissions. The form the participant fills out includes all the info on our physical meeting submission sheets as well as an upload button for their picture. Any photo from any source can be uploaded. You can browse on your computer or select a photo from the device. Here is the link for the form Jerry has generated:

Members can still make verbal comments while their piece is being displayed. Submissions can be made almost right up to the meeting time.

#### Summary of how to use Zoom

Note: These are instructions for PC users. The interface for Mac users should be similar. If you are using a tablet or phone, you need to download the Zoom app and use it to connect to the meeting.

To connect to the meeting: Click the link in the invitation or insert it into your browser: A browser window will open, and Zoom will initiate a download of the small bit of software you need. Run the downloaded

file to install zoom on your system. The meeting should start automatically once the download is complete. You do NOT need to sign up for an account with Zoom, and you definitely do not need to enter a "free trial" of a paid account. It is FREE to join the meeting through Zoom. However, you do need to download the software and run the install.

Setting yourself up in the meeting:

When you first join the meeting. you may be prompted a couple of times to join with computer video and computer audio. The "join with video" will show when you have a camera attached and shows you what your camera view looks like. Select the "Join with video" at the bottom. The "join with computer audio" is next. You can test your speakers and microphone (if you have one) or just select "Join with Computer Audio". Most laptop computers have a built-in webcam and microphone. If using a desktop, you probably have external speakers. You can use your phone as audio if you do not have a microphone for your computer. Click on the up arrow next to the microphone icon at the lower left and select the telephone option. NOTE: You do not need a webcam or a microphone to be part of the meeting. You do need speakers to hear. If you don't have these, people won't be able to see you or hear you, but you will be able to see and hear the meeting. There is a chat feature that you can use to ask questions.

Once you get through the video/audio dialog boxes, the main zoom screen should appear.

There are three major areas of the Zoom Display:

At the top is a strip of thumbnail videos showing all participants. Your login name should be in the thumbnail for you. The middle section is the main display and at the bottom is a set of icons to control the Zoom session.

Left Side Mute button – Turns on/off your microphone

Start/stop Video – Turns on/off your camera not the feed coming to you

Center Invite – Lets you invite others

Participants – Shows you a list of all people attending the meeting Share – Lets you share your screen with the group, do not use.

Chat – Brings up the chat interface

Record - Only Host can do

Far Right Leave Meeting – Use to exit the meeting

Zoom will remove all these "things you can click on" if there is no mouse activity. Just move the mouse to bring them back.

Changing Audio/Video Settings

If your audio or video do not connect automatically, click on the "up arrow" to the right of the icon and it will open a popup menu. The microphone popup menu shows the default microphone and speaker settings. If you don't see the correct ones in the menu, select "Audio Settings". Here you can choose which microphone and speaker you are using and test them to see if they are working. On the left side of the settings window there is a sidebar from which you can select "Video" to select the camera you are using to connect to the meeting.

It is a good idea to keep your microphone muted unless you are asking a question to keep the background noise down.

In the upper right corner there is an open square icon with 4 arrows. Click that icon to make Zoom take up your full screen. In full screen mode, everyone will have a thumbnail view of all the participants in a "filmstrip" popup along one of the sides of the screen. This often gets in the way of the meeting or demo. You can hide it by clicking in it, which will display 3 icons. The small single-bar icon will hide the thumbnails, leaving a small box which will display who is currently talking. This small box can be moved anywhere. Clicking the double bar icon will display the full strip again.

Note: Just remember the meeting streams in HD. If using cellular data you need a good data plan.
