

August Demo- No Math Open Segmented Design

At the August meeting CWT had a great session with tool maven and all round mensh Don McCloskey. Don has brought us word that segmented turning need not be burdened with geometric calculations. With an index wheel, a turner can simply cut and lay out woods on the wheel. These wheels can be downloaded from segmented turner William Smith's website smithart.us. Bill provides index wheels for turnings between 6 and 144 segments per ring. He also provides full techniques and additional consideration for segmented woodturning.

Don first decides on a layout plan which includes pattern, number of segments and colors. He rips his lumber into strips then runs the lumber through a planer, then a sander. Finally segments are cut. Don uses a clever bandsaw jig for the task. Since Don is an

open segmented turner, his pieces must be slightly wider than those used for closed segmented turning to allow for overlapping support for each piece.

Don uses one more of William Smith's ingenious jigs for positioning each piece on the turning. Plans for this jig are at: smithart.us/downloads/Positioning%20jig.pdf . Each piece is glued on with a very small amount of Titebond II wood glue (Don's favorite.)

After completing each ring, the surface is sanded flat with a piece of sandpaper on a flat board. Turning the lathe on at slow speed makes this an easy process. The next row is ready for assembly.

Don uses carbide tip cutters for turning the insides of his segmented turners. Easy Wood Tools and Hunter make excellent tools for this task. When sanding the inside, sandpaper wound on a dowel is the way to go. Remember the only difference between an unfinished open segmented turning and a cheese grater is the segmented blank is much more efficient.

The outside is turned with almost any tool, but a spindle gouge would be a great choice.

Don prepared a small segmented for us to try. Yours truly was one of the lucky ones who gave it a shot. The segmented pieces meant that I was always turning face (long grain alignment.) The result was as smooth an experience as

Jérôme Blanc August Demo Review

I know what you are thinking. "This woodturning is great, but I'm tired of looking at the same old tool catalogs. If I could peruse a Victoria's Secret catalog for woodturning supplies; that would be fantastic!" Fellow turner, this is your lucky day. More on this in a while. Who brought us this piece of good news? Jérôme Blanc, a talented young woodturner from Switzerland. He is experimental in his approach to woodturning, and gains as much inspiration from the mountains near his home in Geneva as he does from the buildings of Philadelphia, where he was a resident artist with the International Woodturning Exchange. The AAW recognized Jérôme with the 2009 POP Merit Award, purchasing his sculpture "Osmose" for their permanent collection. Osmose is a 15½ inch tall maple turning with large elliptical voids. The wood is stained black, and the entire turning wrapped in thin stainless steel cable. Since the maple is paper thin in places, it's a marvel that the cumulative stress from the cable doesn't crush the sculpture. No wonder the AAW was so impressed.

In July, Jérôme treated CWT to an all day demonstration. He introduced his bowls with acrylic insert. These bowls have a straightforward form, but get complex from there. After three cycles of rough turning and months of drying, the bowls are fairly stable. They are then mounted sideways on a sled and cut at an angle on a bandsaw. An acrylic insert is then glued in the bisected bowl such that the cut kerf compensates perfectly for the thickness of the bowl. Great care is needed to perfectly realign the original grain pattern. Jérôme uses two part glue designed to hold laminates on wooden kitchen counters. The bowl is remounted and turned inside and out. A perfectly sized cap and tenon are used to stabilize the bowl as it's turned to final thickness.

The result of Jérôme's effort is a bowl with a florescent acrylic stripe which catches light in unexpected ways. The bowls are airy and playful.

Jerome seems to excel at the unexpected. His top burned bowls are made from green wood. Before turning the bowl he actually burns the surface until it begins to crack and develop the distinctive black fissured pattern. The surface soot is removed with a scotch bright pad, then sealed off with a clear acrylic. A small recess is turned in the top center of the bowl. The contrasting textures are breathtaking.

A favorite project among those at the hands on demonstration was a cylindrical turning with tapered ends. About half of the turning was completely wrapped with high quality painters tape. The lathe was reversed and turned to almost minimal operating speed. The taped half of the turning was then cut randomly with a flapper sanding disk mounted on an angle grinder. Since the angle grinder and lathe are running in opposite directions the danger is minimized. Note this is still a very advanced technique. If you try it, make sure that all safety guards are in place and the angle grinder is held at about 45[°] from the turning. The resulting grooves are painted black with an airbrush. Pick off the painters tape to reveal a crisp mysterious line randomly wondering over half the turning.

Now take a propane torch and blacken the other half of the turning. Remove most of the surface soot with a scotch bright pad. Repeat the random angle grinder process to reveal light colored lines over a black surface. Since there is supposed to be a transition section in the center, a bit of black and white overlap is encouraged.

If you would like, treat the entire section to a transparent acrylic finish, red for example. This will be picked up by the bare wood sections, while being masked by the soot and black painted



sections. The results are quite wonderful and baffling. It was great fun to see several of these pieces in the July gallery. The most common response was "Now how in the world did they do THAT?"

Oh, I almost forgot about the lacy underwear technique. Jérôme uses Victoria Secret lace as a spray paint mask for some of his turnings. Simple, striking, and a technique we've never seen before. So if you see a Victoria Secret catalog in my shop, it's a supply catalog. That's my story and I'm sticking to it.



In addition to being an entertaining knowledgeable turner, Jérôme is a very giving person. You see, he learned English to be able to better communicate his methods with us. In fact, CWT was his first all day demonstration in English. We all thought he had a great command of the language.

I'm sure we are all grateful to Jérôme Blanc for visiting and sharing so openly with us. We wish him the very best of luck with all he does and look forward to catching up with all the jaw dropping techniques he comes up with. Keep an eye on this guy, fellow turners. He is a true pioneer.
