Demonstration Report

Adding Textures to Turnings



Our demonstrator for the month of August, 2021, was Roberto Ferrer. Roberto is both a turner and a sculptor. His innovative use of a grinder, in combination with a creative holding jig, has allowed him to make

windmill-like wall hangings like none other seen before. You can see examples in his meso-American series on his website, www.ferrerstudioart.com. But the subject of his presentation this evening was to show us how he achieves surface ornamentation of turned bowls using carving tools or rotary bits in a Dremel tool.

Roberto enjoys adding texture to the outside of his turnings. He turns at about 800 rpm, or faster for smaller pieces. He doesn't like to use sandpaper because it makes his tools dull. Instead, he prefers carving. He has a beautiful set of "Swiss Made" carving tools with octagonal handles and relatively long, shiny steel blades. The handles of the tools have a number code, such as "7/12," where the "7" defines the shape of the tip while the "12" tells us the diameter of the steel, in millimeters. With carving tools, Roberto says you "follow the grain." His carving appears on the top of a flat bowl, with a small central depression, *a la* Graeme Priddle. Or the

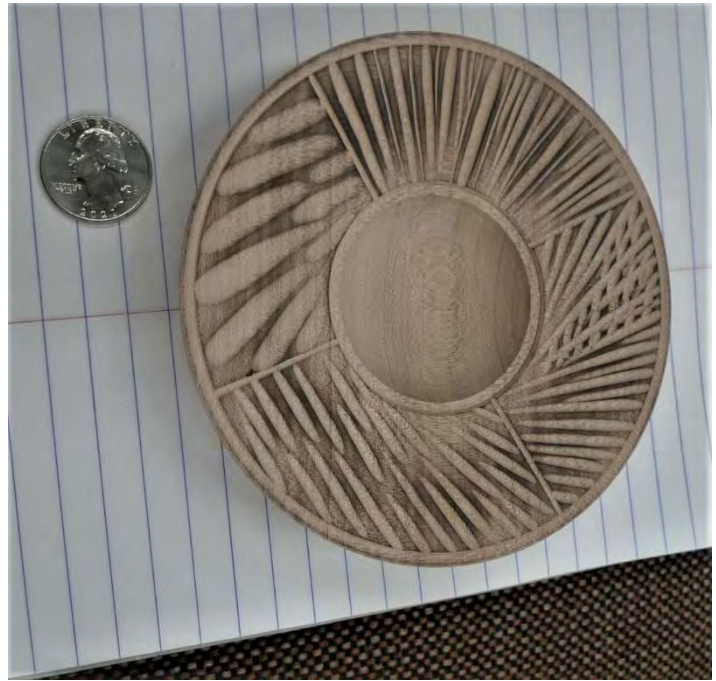
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carvings can be limited to the rim of a platter, or to the entire outside of a traditional bowl.

To hold the piece, Roberto likes to make threaded inserts which fit onto the headstock. These inserts can accept a circular plywood disk, against which the top of a bowl will be placed. He then attaches a scroll chuck to the tail stock end of his lathe and places a self-turned “soft touch” between the chuck and the base of the bowl. His process is to draw pencil lines on the turned piece, and then carve using these lines as a guide.

Roberto also demonstrated the use of reciprocating carving tool on his turnings. Three different sizes of rotary bits were also demonstrated, each of 1/8-inch diameter so it would fit into a Dremel tool. Roberto uses a router speed controller to adjust the rpm of these bits. He starts with the larger bit and then progresses through the intermediate and small sized bits to incise his patterns into the turnings.

On some of his turnings, you will find Roberto likes to use milk paint. He likes to use the “Old Fashion” brand, which until recently was available through Rockler, but is still advertised as available on Amazon. Milk paint is available in a wide variety of colors. In practice, Roberto will apply the dark colors first, then after drying overnight, the light. He will apply milk paint to the entire outside of the bowl and leave the inner surface natural. Or he may limit application to just the rim, as an accent. The addition of color can be striking.



I recently had an opportunity to visit briefly with Roberto at his home. Stacked in his driveway were some “cookies,” which are made by a bandsaw mill that cuts through a tree trunk oriented in a vertical position, as it would have stood when alive. Roberto had separated each cookie with a pair of one-inch square stickers, to allow air to circulate on both the upper and lower surface of each. My guess is that each of these pieces is destined to become one of Roberto’s signature wall hangings. About 30 feet away was a collection of vertical slabs, each about 4-inches thick, which appear to have been cut with a chainsaw. Clearly, this was the home of a wood turner.

Drawing is something that seems to be an early talent for Roberto. In his recent online interview with David Ellsworth at the AAW meeting just past, Roberto

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mentioned that even in grade school, he would often do drawings during his classes. Was it a childhood artistic compulsion? Was he following the example of a sibling, a parent, or a mentor? Apparently, none of the latter. But when I asked, he mentioned something he learned from his father, who said, “If you do something, just make sure you do it right.” I think we can all agree that Roberto is following his father’s advice.

Playing the Odds from Paul Shotola

Are you a gambler? Play the odds? Feeling lucky? Maybe you are lucky. Or have been lucky. I was lucky. I played the odds. The odds caught up to me.

At the BOC work-day, I had a staved cylinder come apart. The reasons are many and varied. Starved glue joints, excessive RPM, insufficient time for the glue to properly set, etc. The reasons don’t matter. It came apart anyway. A piece cut my lip. A piece smashed and cut my thumb, my turning muscle (my belly) was bruised and cut. Sure, it could have been worse. A lost eye, losing my rugged good looks, losing the use of my hand, etc. Could have been much worse. Much worse.

I’ve been a gambler. I’ve played the odds. I was lucky. After the accident, I said: ‘I’ve been turning over 25 years, and this is the first accident I’ve had’. Any wood shop accidents I’ve heard of have involved experienced wood workers, none of them had had an accident before. The odds caught up with us.

The longer we work in the shop without a mishap, the closer we are to having one. The numbers march on, the odds get narrower. Not having an accident for 25 years only means that one is closer. Those are the odds.

Can we improve the odds? Increase the length of time until the inevitable? Sure. Hindsight tells me that there are a number of things I could have done. Hindsight is 20/20, as you know. Lower speed, more set up time, more glue, and especially a face shield. All simple things, all free, all easy. The only excuse for not doing them is complacency. I thought that just because I hadn’t had an accident for 25 years meant that I wasn’t going to. I was wrong. I played the odds and the odds caught up to me.

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Are you a gambler? Do you play the odds? Is your luck about to run out?

Frank's presentation for July was First Cuts, ABCs. Every wood turner should remember the A, B, Cs.

ANCHOR. BEVEL, CUT

ANCHOR.

Set the tool firmly on the tool rest. The forces of the cut must be taken by the tool rest in a direct a manner as possible.

BEVEL.

Always begin with the handle low, so that the bevel is the first part of the tool steel that contacts the spinning wood.

CUT.

Slowly raise the handle until the cutting edge engages the wood and begins to cut a shaving. Keep the handle as low as possible while still producing a shaving.

Practice this and your A, B, Cs will not translate to **ANCHOR, BEVEL, CATCH !**

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More than a dozen CWT members attended; some old reliables (Andy, Clint, Al, Brenda), some fairly new. A good time was had by all. The blood was cleaned up and young cancer patients and hungry citizens both benefitted.
