

On November 12th, Scott Barrett welcomed the assembled members to the last regular meeting of the Chicago Woodturners under his presidency. Scott announced that the next CWT meeting would be our annual holiday party on December 10th. It will be held at Rossini di Lucca, 1280 E. Dundee Road in Palatine. The party will be between 6:30 and 9:30 Dinner should roll out about 7:00. Payment and registration is required so that the restaurant will know how many dinners to prepare. The fee is \$15 per person.

Our retiring newsletter editor and current presidential candidate Al Miotke introduced Terry McCammon as our new newsletter editor beginning in January.

There will be one business matter during next month's party. We will hold a quick election to consider Al Miotke for President and Marie Anderson for Secretary. Chances are this will be a quick procedure.

Open Segmented Demo Review

Finally, we got a demonstration by nice guy Bill Robb. He is an accomplished segmented woodturner. Just in time for holiday turning he demonstrated construction of



elegant open segmented holiday ornaments.

Like a trusted Sherpa, Bill guided us through the tricky planning and construction challenges. Questions asked at the beginning of a project might be what is the shape of the sphere? Is it to be open segmented? What about the size of tenons which will support the finials on either end of the sphere? One advantage segmented turners have in making ornaments is that that the empty space in the sphere is constructed, not hollowed from a solid piece of wood.

Laying out the segments is а critical part of planning. As an example, if segmented turning is to be divided into 12 sections per ring, each segment



will be cut at 30° ($360^{\circ} \div 12$). If the turning is to be open segmented the sections must be reduced by a third (10° off, 20° remaining). Divide the result by 2 and the cut angle must be set to only 10° . See? It's great to have a guide.

Bill was full of very helpful hints designed to make the process of segmented turning much easier. Of course the cut and assembled segments can and should be engineered to have a uniform grain direction that runs perpendicularly from the lathe bed. This keeps the piece from coming apart as the wood naturally swells and contracts. An added benefit is that the turner is always cutting face grain. None of that tricky transition to end grain.

When the turning is designed (all turnings should be designed, all segmented turnings must be designed) the woodturner will know exactly how many individual segments must be cut and prepared. When preparing his segments, Bill puts his staves together for a gang cut. This means that if there are 150 pieces in the

turning, and they are prepared in a gang of three, there are only 50 cuts necessary. This also cuts down on the tear out inherent to cutting pieces one at a time.

Bill introduced us to three jigs very useful to segmented woodturners. The first of these is the Distol jig, popular in medical circles and adapted for woodturning. Doctors

use it to help set particuarly nasty bone fractures use it to control particularly cumbersome small stacked segments. Although this is not a favorite jig of Bill's, it is effective at what it does.



Another Bill, Bill Smith is a woodturner who advocates use of a positioning wheel to accurately glue up segments on the lathe with exact spaces in between. When segments are glued and make another ring, they are sanded flat and are ready to receive the next ring. Bill Smith's jig uses different indexing wheels depending on the number of segments in the ring.

Bill Robb's final jig is for cutting precise segments on the bandsaw. It features a threaded nut to precisely adjust the length of the segments. One of the cardinal rules of segmented turning is precision in the angle and length of individual segments. Careful turners will prepare a few extra pieces, just in case the woodturning demons demand a small sacrifice.

Bill Robb continues the traditional meticulousness care demanded by this wing of woodturning art. Our gratitude to Bill Robb for his generous demonstration. My personal thanks to Bill for allowing me to return to my beloved favorite job of reviewing demonstrations for the Chicago Woodturners, even if just for this brief piece.



Bonnie Klein Demo Clint Stevens

Bonnie Klein visited the Chicago Woodturners (CWT) on November 9th. Bonnie is one of those woodturners that I would love to have met when starting this craft. Her unique insight and teaching skills can get beginning woodturners off to a screaming start. In fact she has properly launched untold numbers of young turners. Fortunately she is just as good at teaching woodturners who are only young at heart.



Bonnie is a thrifty woodturner and has shown how to sharpen with simple MDF jigs and buff with a small buffing wheel held on her lathe by an arbor. These are the

techniques that appeal to us frugal craftsmen.

If you are anything like me, and I know I am, your chatter tool is very good at making grooves in the turning rather than chattering. Since Bonnie is a black belt at chatter she gave us the secrets of chattering:

- The chatter tool must be held perpendicular to the face of the turning.
- The path of the tool is always 7:30 (am or pm, your choice).
- Close the angle of the chatter tool and face of the work a bit to allow the spring to flutter.
- Pick evenly dense grained wood for your project.
- Chatter at about 3,000 rpm (Bonnie likes speed).

Well, these aren't secrets any longer. Bonnie encouraged defining the boundaries of chatter work with small grooves at the beginning and end of the work and using color from felt pens to set them off.

Bonnie then one upped herself by showing that it's possible to put a spiral chatter on the side of a turned egg. The secret (good thing I'm not trusted with many secrets, isn't it?) is



to turn the connecting portion so narrow that the egg vibrates as you texture it.

One of the skills Bonnie uses is managing speed safely to get great finish cuts on her turnings. Speed is fine as long as the diameter of the turning (in inches) times the lathe speed (rpm) less than about 7,000. She makes this happen by mounting the turnings onto small glue blocks fixed with a threaded nut on the spindle end. Needless to say it's a good idea to have the threads on the nut match that on the spindle.

With chatter work skills well explained, Bonnie delighted her audience by making one of her renowned spin top boxes. There was much joy. This box was constructed from a rather large dowel, with the help of the Bonnie Klein Threading Jig (visit bonnieklein.com for more information). Threading is an art form which involves cutting the threads two or three times, and reinforcing them with small amounts of cyanoacrylate glue, careful fitting, and large amounts of practice.

By the way, Bonnie has loaded her web site with many "handouts" that teach her step by step methods of creating many projects including the spin top boxes.



Bonnie does dabble in acrylic and bone boxes too. Yes, turned bone boxes. Delving into such craft is as much mystery as craft. It involves boiling and bleaching (hydrogen peroxide only) the bones. Take it from me, the results are beautiful but the mess and smell may send you screaming back to the comfort of wood.

No doubt about it, Bonnie Klein is a true artist and educator. It's been my pleasure to see her demonstrate and teach a few times. It's never the same twice and I learned something new every time. With any luck at all we will be able to host Bonnie

several more times in the future. Thanks Bonnie, you ignited many artistic fires at CWT, and we can't wait for you to come back soon.
