Demonstration Report

Turned Chalice Paul Rosen



Our demonstrator for November 2021, was Rich Nye. For his demo, Rich chose to show us how he turns a three-part chalice that he learned to turn from his class with Nick Agar. Agar had shown us how he turns this spindle project in a previous club demo; Nick said in that demo that the chalice had "paid his rent" for over a decade, as it was an easy project to turn (for him) and sold well to his customers.


Dr. Rich Nye (DVM) is a man of many talents. Long-time Cubs fans may recognize him from his stint as a left-handed reliever on the 1969 Cubs under manager Leo "the Lip" Durocher. But his initial academic training as a civil engineer came from the University of California at Berkley. He later worked on the Sears Tower aka Willis tower in Chicago. His baseball career was cut short in 1970, due to injuries, but he entered a post-baseball career by enrolling in veterinary medicine school at the University of Illinois in 1972, graduating in 1976. He worked at the Niles Animal Hospital in Niles, Illinois, where he developed an interest in treating exotic birds. But he also became a commodities trader on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. His interest in treating exotic birds led him to become a charter member of the Association of Avian Veterinarians (AAV) founded in 1980. He later served as the president of that organization (1989). In 1985, he joined

with two other veterinarians to found the Midwest Bird and Exotic Animal Hospital in Westchester, IL. He and his wife, Susan (also a veterinarian), eventually sold their interest in that facility in 2005.

Rich has also flourished as woodturner. I recall seeing some of his expertly-turned pet funeral urns, as well as a large turned egg with an about-to-hatch baby bird pecking its way through the shell. As I recall, this was a treasured retirement gift to a fellow avian veterinarian. But today's demo involved a piece of pear, about 10-inches long, turned to a cylinder perhaps 2-1/2- to 3-inches in diameter. The blank was secured firmly in the jaws of a scroll chuck. The piece itself is divided roughly into three equal parts: the large

flared lip at the top, the bowl, and the thin stem connecting to the flared base. Rich began by turning the top flared lip with his 1/2-inch bowl gouge; the lip decreased in diameter down to about 3/4-inch. A central hole, about 1/2-inch in diameter, had to be drilled in order to permit the hollowing-out of the bowl section. Rich attached a drill bit to a drill chuck whose Morse taper was positioned into the tailstock. He put his hand around the drill chuck to steady it as he turned the tailstock wheel, but the bit was either dull or slightly off center, which





led to some chattering. Rich thought that if a brad point bit had been used, rather than a standard drill bit, drilling would have been easier. Fortunately, a 3/8-inch spindle gouge can be used as a drill bit as an alternative to a dull drill bit. With the hole completed, Rich turned to hollowing-out the bowl portion.

Consider the bowl shape. You could opt for an apple shape or an egg shape. Rich chose the egg shape, which is not surprising.

After all, he raises chickens...very healthy chickens. Once the external contours of the bowl shape were completed, Rich demonstrated the shear-cut technique, where the flute of the gouge is almost completely closed and the tool handle is oriented downward at about a 45-degree angle. This produces the very fine "angel hair" dust shavings while smoothing out the wood surface to minimize the need for aggressive sanding. Next, Rich decided to hollow out the bowl, setting the lathe speed to about 1000 rpm. To do hollowing, he used both the carbide-tipped straight and hook-tools from Mike Jackofsky of southern California (www.mikejackofsky.com), whom you will recall was a guest demonstrator for CWT. The objective was not to have a paper-thin bowl. Rather, it was to remove enough weight so the chalice was not top heavy and less likely to be knocked over. Rich emphasized that the hollowing tools should not be used too aggressively. Instead, after every few strokes, it is wise to remove shavings from the bowl. To do this, you could use a plastic straw, but that often results in a facefull of wood shavings. A more practical technique is to invest in a small plastic tube that can be attached to an air compressor. One such accessory is available from www.conestoga.com of Edmond, Oklahoma. The splash screen of the website has an image of a conestoga wagon, which is perhaps an historical reference to Edmond, but of little relevance to the woodturning accessories offered through the site. A less expensive alternative, but fully functional, is a short piece (24 inches) of PVC tubing with a natural curve that you can buy at Menards or your local Ace Hardware.

Turning the final third includes the narrow stem and the flared base. Rich set the lathe speed to around 1200 rpm, as the stem can be quite narrow. Stabilizing the flared lip with tailstock support is a good idea at this point. Now, you can make whatever beads and coves you desire, at a thickness/thinness that belies your turning skills and/or willingness to take risks before turning the flared base. Rich showed us some examples of his chalice turnings, both works in





progress and finished projects. One was a chalice by Nick Agar, which included chatter tool work the on outside of the bowl surface, as well as surface painting and air brushing. Agar is considered an expert at air brushing techniques, and Rich proved to

be a quick study. He showed us one of his completed projects, which included a wood-burned dragon-fly design on the bowl. The piece was later tinted with a yellow-colored finish applied via air brush and allowed to dry. This was followed selectively with red highlighting, which made for a stunningly attractive finish and shape. If air-brush finishing appeals to you, consider the website, www.chroma-craft.com, which offers a broad choice of finishing products, including the Nick Agar Signature Series of wood finishing products.

From the Safety Officer, Frank Pagura

ELECTRICITY AND YOUR LATHE.

Fatal electrocutions, while working with your lathe, are rare.

But electric shocks that fail to kill are much more common. Whether a shock is fatal often comes down to luck- it depends on whether there is a low resistance path for the current to ground. If, for example, you

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are standing on a wet concrete floor or having your hands on a lathe that is grounded, more current will pass to your body, and may kill you.

So it is wise to check your lathe electrical system occasionally. Make sure that all connections are secure, all wires and cord insulation are not damaged. Check for proper grounding, and don't forget to check lathe accessories, such as work-light wiring commonly used on your lathe.

Working vibrations have the tendency to loosen screws to electric wire connections and, if ignored, will lead to more serious consequences. Be warned that frayed insulation on black wire cords is not easily spotted by a superficial glance - you should be extra careful when doing this task. All sparks, smoke, and overheating coming from your lathe are signs that you have pushed your luck far enough.
