At a Yorktown Center newsstand I spotted a handcarved, sandalwood elephant, about 2 inches tall, for only \$5.00. My first reaction was, "I can


make one of these!" Having never pierced anything, this was worth researching.

Coincidentally, the AAW "Keep Turning" newsletter highlights piercing with Matthew Zander's article "The Ins and Outs of Piercing." Zander relates how woodturner Frank Sodol pioneered the use of dental drills for piercing. It's a great primer for piercing.

There's even a CWT connection! Sodol takes credit for introducing Binh Pho to piercing. Pho promptly took it way beyond Sodol's expectations.

So what does one need to pierce hollow forms? A great topic for a future Interactive Demo, but let's look at a few options.

On the high-end, the NSK Presto is an air compressor driven dental drill. At \$600, it

may not be your first piercing tool.

A less expensive option would be an electric rotary tool. A search online brought up a large number of choices in the \$100 to \$300 range.

A variable speed Dremel Stylo is only \$50 and you can add a flexible shaft a for \$35.

Presto vs Dremel? The Presto spins at 350,000 rpm, the Dremel, around 30,000 rpm. 10x the speed makes a Exciting Deserve Bird Dis

difference, the bit moves smoothly through intricate curves and patterns.

Once you have a tool to pierce with, you are also setup to carve! At what point does a pierced hole become so large it's no longer a hole, but a feature? It's a fine line between piercing and carving. Your creativity. Can be endless!

You may already be ready to start piercing. What self respecting shop doesn't already have a Dremel collecting dust on a shelf? The Dremel collection of bits for carving wood looks extensive and inexpensive. A great way to start exploring the world of piercing.

Excuse me while I go look for my Dremel ...

There is nothing fancy about Raffan's demos, he doesn't have a charming intro with fancy formatting, he's not a ham, no funny faces, he doesn't waste time explaining the minutiae of the process, he just shows us what he is doing in a humble human manner.



You will see him make mistakes, make bad cuts, break projects, cut himself on a sharp edge, and generally approach each project with a self-effacing attitude that gets the job done in a minimum amount of time.


This guy was a long time production turner who made his bread and butter, before becoming famous, by making and selling treen by the hundreds.

He has loads of professional tips that just pop up as part of his production process. It is all that and they are generally pretty short-- it's not a big time commitment.

In woodturning circles today Richard Raffan is best known as a writer and teacher, for his books, videos, and magazine articles, as well as for demonstrations and hands-on workshops.

But this notoriety came upon him in the mid-1980s on the back of a reputation established in the crafts in Britain in the 1970s, well before woodturning took off as the popular hobby and aspiring art form it is today, and before he moved to Australia in 1982.


