Applying the Golden Ratio to Cleopatra

How to apply the Golden Ratio to turning is still a bit elusive. The new Cleopatra movie poster with Gal Godot seemed to scream Golden Ratio, so I thought I would investigate. I have the


Golden Proportion grid as a transparent file that I can overlay on any picture.


I found this image of Mona Lisa overlaid with a Golden Ratio grid.


When you interactively move and scale a grid over another image, different parts of the image magically line up with the grid.

Over the last year, in different turning demonstrations, the two-thirds proportion rule also can be used. I was happy to find the image to the right that confirms that rule.

Golden ratio dividers for makeup artists are plentiful online. They ensure that permanent eyebrows are placed correctly on one's face. Who wants permanent eyebrows that are not in the right place?







We can always grab another piece of wood on the lathe and make another one!

Safety Report | Frank Pagura

Tonight, the safety subject is the Peke Safety C4 Protective Helmet with Enclosed Respirator.

This line of helmets was developed for the welding industry and forest fire crews. The self-contained filtered air source straps on the operator's waist and is piped directly to the safety helmet. The helmet has a large unobstructed face shield and is light and comfortable.

The batteries have proven to last well over six hours continuous use with the normal speed setting. The most significant result of the test



was the absence of a reaction when turning and sanding Katalox wood (A species that I have a sensitive reaction to). The purchase price is around \$650 (www.pekesafety.com).

Will continue to use this package the rest of this month and report back at the August meeting.

Interactive Demonstration | *Mark Dreyer*

Peppermills & Upgrading Your Kitchen

Mark Dreyer takes us beyond pens to talk about making peppermills and other turned objects for your kitchen.

Utility turnings incorporate many of the same techniques that are used in making pens, from using hardwoods to hybrids to casting. It allows for a great variation of turnings for your craft show.

Traditional handles using the same threaded inserts make it possible to switch out the apparatus, from potato mashers to micro-graters to pizza cutters, they are interchangeable. Your customer can mix and match their utensil.

Smaller utensils can even use a pen blank as a starting point for your handle. Bottle stoppers use small pieces of wood. Exotic Blanks (exoticblanks.com) sells many types of utensils, as well as blanks.

Casting your own blanks provide you with even more creative designs for your handles. Spectraply is another great material to use for handles.

Inserts are easy to use, but beware of using translucent or clear blanks. Painting the insert white can help hide the insert, even amplifying the color of the blank. Sometimes painting the inside of the hole works too. Testor's model paints work well, available at Hobby Lobby.

Mandrels gives you the ability to mount your blanks from one side only. Creating your own bushings will help you standardize your handle diameters. Mandrels from Niles Bottle Stoppers work well, also available from Exotic Blanks.

Take extra care when using materials like Spectraply, where you want consistent positioning of your utensil relative to the grain or ply.

Bottle stoppers come in a variety of configurations and make for very cool objects.

Mark uses threaded eyebolts to hang his handles and can spray with lacquer in a production mode. He loves Yorkshire grit for final sanding of his handles. Original grit for wood and the micro grit for resins and hybrids.

Peppermills and salt shakers:

Mark uses his Easy Woods Tools chuck and carbide-tipped tools for the entire demonstration. The chuck does look pretty easy to use!

He does remind us that the use of masks is important for dust filtration and always protection for your head because you never know when something can fly off the lathe and smack you in your eyes!

For peppermills. salt shakers, bottle stoppers and handles, Mark appreciates the ease at which carbide-tipped tools can shape the wood without needing to have more expertise with skews and gouges, riding bevel angles, etc.

Mark even talked about the 1/3 ratio for proportions of his shakers and grinders (See front page). Beading tools are great for making small beads.

Mark, thanks for expanding into more things to turn beyond pens!





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Providing Arts In Medicine For Children With Serious Illness

The Chicago Woodturners have been donating Beads of Courage Boxes and Bags to the Lurie Children's Hospital for over eight years. Club members have provided hundreds (we lost count long ago) of turned boxes and hand-sewn bags for distribution to the patients at Lurie who are undergoing treatment for cancer and other serious diseases.

We have participated in personal distribution events at the hospital and regularly meet with the hospital staff member in charge of this program to replenish their supply.

Chicago Woodturners also have Beads of Courage workdays at the Chicago School of Woodworking where members can gather to assemble boxes together.

The Beads of Courage charity was founded in 2003 by Jean Baruch, a pediatric oncology nurse in Tucson, Arizona. It began as a small program aimed at using colorful beads to provide children coping with serious illnesses a tangible way to share their medical journeys.

Inspired by the resilience and bravery she witnessed in her young patients, Baruch noticed that traditional methods of tracking medical progress with charts and numbers did not adequately capture the emotional and psychological aspects of their experiences. In response, she created the Beads of Courage program to provide an alternative method of honoring and acknowledging the challenges faced by these children.

The program assigns specific beads to represent different medical procedures, treatments, and milestones in a child's journey. Each bead tells a part of their story, becoming a physical symbol of their courage, resilience, and achievements. The beads are proudly worn on a string, allowing children to share their stories with others and find strength and support in their journey.

Over time, the Beads of Courage program spread to hospitals across the United States and gained international recognition. The charity expanded its scope to support children with various chronic conditions, including cancer, cardiac conditions, rare diseases, and burn injuries.




Its mission is to improve the quality of life for these children and their families by providing them with a meaningful way to cope, find strength, and celebrate their milestones.

The Beads of Courage charity continues to grow and evolve, with ongoing research and collaboration with medical professionals, researchers, and child life specialists. Its impact extends beyond the beads themselves, as it aims to foster a culture of support, empathy, and understanding for children facing medical challenges.

Bead Bowl/Box Guidelines

Beads of Courage members may receive thousands of beads. It is desirable for your boxes to hold them all. As a result, turned or rectangular lidded boxes need to be large.

Dimensions:

- Interior for turned boxes: 6" diameter (5" min.), 5" height (4" min.)
- Interior for flatwork boxes: 4"x6"x4"

· Base and lids:

- Box bases should be wide enough so the box is stable and does not tip over easily.
- Lids for Beads of Courage boxes should be easy for small or ill children to remove
 or lift. Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate so
 they don't break.

Design considerations:

· Avoid excessively elaborate designs that may easily break or be damaged;

The Chicago Woodturners regularly donates \$25 to receive BOC logo beads for you to include anywhere within or outside the box.

Each logo bead comes with a Woodworker Artist card where you can include your personal signature. While these beads are not mandatory, you can appreciate how the beads and cards connect our art with the Beads of Courage mission. Everyone who receives a box or bag also has a personal connection to Chicago Woodturners members.

Finishes:

- Bowls must be safely sealed. Please use a safe finishing process without toxic materials.
 Bowls that have not been properly sealed can harbor mold which is dangerous to our members with compromised immune systems.
- Do not use finishes like linseed oil or other finishes that take a long time to outgas.
- Refrain from painting the boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, a stain, and/or burning.

Bead Bag Guidelines

Occasionally a patient will not want, or require, a box and a bag is provided. The bags are also useful when a patient wishes to transport a portion of larger collection of beads to procedure. Many of the patients who receive these have hundreds of beads.

Please use the following directions for sewing bead bags to ensure consistency. If you have questions, Brenda Miotke and Rosemary Pagura have made hundreds of these.

Materials needed (per bag):

- 2 pieces 9 x 12"outer fabric
- 2 pieces 9 x 12" lining fabric
- 2 pieces Cording or ribbon 26"
- Beads of Courage Bead Bag label and" caring artist card" (available from CWT)

Instructions:

- Sew Beads of Courage label in middle lower part or right corner of 1 piece of outer fabric.
- 2. Stitch pieces of patterned fabric together along the long edge.
- 3. Do the same process with lining fabric and iron the seams open.
- 4. Turn lining fabric right side out and place into outer fabric (right sides will be facing each other).
- 5. Stitch 1/4" from the top all the way around top.
- 6. To attach fabric together, iron seam open and turn right side out-

- outer fabric will be facing out now.
- 7. To make the "tunnel" for the cording, stitch all the way around 1/2" from the top catching both the outer and lining fabrics.
- 8. Reinforce the side seams using reverse stitch.
- 9. Stitch all the way around 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the top catching both outer and lining fabrics.
- 10. Reinforce at side seams.
- 11. Using a seam ripper, open at side seams through the outer fabric only.
- 12. Turn bag inside out, and serge layers at the bottom together.
- 13. Turn right side out, and using a safety pin, thread cording through the 'tunnel' starting at one seam opening and ending at the same seam.
- 14. Repeat starting at the other seam.
- 15. Please include a "caring artist card" in each bag

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NEIL TURNER

Woven through all of Neil Turner's artwork is a deep respect for the material and the natural forces that have acted upon it. A powerful example of this is Neil's fire form sculptures where he explores the dancing, ever changing patterns of flame. He works in negative, observing the subtle interplay of light and shadow and creating fluid forms from this very solid material.

He primarily uses Australian timbers and works in a highly sympathetic way with the material, the natural features of the timber informing the finished piece.

Neil's work has been shown in galleries across Australia and internationally. His fine sculptures and furniture feature in both public and private collections and he has received public art commissions. This is a project that is great for beginners to professionals for the various techniques required to complete these wig stands including spindle turning, beads and coves, bowl turning, joining, and finishing. There is the potential to use up scraps that you may otherwise throw away by laminating them into blanks sized for this project.

Gentlemen, this is not just a 'women in turning' project. The WIT Committee has chosen to create nationwide awareness of this effort, and stress that turning wig stands is a project that is open to anyone interested in participating so please, give it a go.

It's a fast and easy project that can be completed in one session or broken up into several turning sessions, thus even small amounts of available free time can be used and you now have a good reason to stand at your lathe!

Dimensions are shown in the informational link shown above and as long as you stay within the dimension guidelines, the turned design is completely open, so have fun, experiment, learn (or teach someone?) and enjoy. The only requirement is the final finish for the wig stands needs to be polyurethane which protects from moisture and/or oil transferring between the wig and the stand.
