Happy New Year. It's been a year into my term as your President. Our Club has had a busy year and 2024 will be even busier. By the time you read this newsletter, registration for Turn-On! Chicago will be open.

During 2023 we had three pen turning events with the Scouts, high schoolers and a few seniors.

The Midwest Pen Gathering had a number of CWT members demonstrating and volunteering.

We had in person demonstrations and classes from Laurent Niclot from France (via Colorado) and Neil Turner from Australia and missed out on a visit from Joss Naigeon from France (via the AAW Symposium in Louisville) when she had to stay in France due to a health issue.

The Club sponsored Beginning Spindle and Bowl Turning classes were fully subscribed.

Our Past President, Andy Kuby, has been leading our new monthly Open Shop Days and everybody who has been able to attend the last Sunday of the month has got some good projects made.

We sponsored two Empty Bowl events that raised over \$4,000 for local food pantries; and we sent over 500 pens to the Pens for Troops organization.

During our January meeting we will be discussing a potential new location and time for our monthly meetings. Our current meeting location is difficult for some of our members to access due to the long stairways and no elevator. Not to mention the difficulties we have had with the air conditioning system in the summer and the internet and parking issues we seem to have on a consistent basis.

Frank Magnifico has led a committee to find CWT a new meeting place. We believe we have found a new space at the Arlington Heights Senior Center, located a mile and one half south of our current meeting location. See the separate article about the space (Page 5). We need the approval of our membership.

The Senior Center has better meeting space, good internet, great heating and air conditioning, storage for our lathe and A/V equipment, no stairs and ample parking.



Due to scheduling of existing programs at the Center, we will have to move our meeting to the second Thursday of the month. The rental charge is the same as we pay now.

Kurt and Al are looking for more volunteers for Turn-On! Chicago. Kurt will be talking about which committees he is specifically looking for help with at our January meeting.

Brenda is putting the final touches on the Odyssey Event at Stevenson High School on February 13 and 14. More information and volunteering opportunities will be discussed at the January meeting.

Mike Canfield, our Treasurer, will present our Budget and 2023 Financial recap at our February meeting. He is busy getting everything ready for our accountant for the annual tax filings.

Rich Nye is putting together another great year of meeting demonstrators and visiting professional woodturners for classes. More information at our February meeting.

Meeting Space Change

After a number of issues we have had with our current meeting space including two flights of stairs, limited parking during athletic events, spotty air conditioning during the summer and more, the Board of the CWT asked Frank Magnifico and Don Felch to find us a new meeting space.

Frank and Don visited numerous potential meeting spaces in the Arlington Heights area. Most of the spaces were not suitable (limited parking, not ADA accessible, too small, no storage).

Fortunately, Frank and Don have both taught classes and attended classes at the Arlington Heights Senior Center. After discussions with the Park District, we were able to come to an agreement to move our meetings from Christian Liberty Academy to the Arlington Heights Senior Center.

The Senior Center satisfies all of our requirements. The only change is due to

scheduling conflicts we will have to move our monthly meeting to the second Thursday of the month.

Reviewing our list of requirements:

The Senior Center is ADA accessible. There are no stairs other than the curb from the parking lot to the sidewalk (and there is a ramp available by the doorway).

Climate controlled spaces are always working when the building is in use.

Meeting rooms are configurable and the main meeting room has space for about 100 people with restrooms next to the space and parking for 200 cars or so.

Storage for our lathe, A/V equipment and library is available in a hallway outside the Woodshop. We will have to build / buy a cabinet to store and lock our A/V equipment.

Public Wifi is available for all. We are investigating a wired connection but the building is wired for connections.

The Senior Center is approximately 2 miles south of Christian Liberty Academy.

We will have to move our meeting day from second Tuesday of the month to the second Thursday of the month since the Senior Center is not open on Tuesday night.

The Board has approved the move and we will be asking the CWT membership for approval at our January meeting. If all of the paperwork can be completed, we will have our March meeting on the second Thursday

Circuit Board Pen Kit



Berea UV Pen Kit

Making Custom Label Pens

There are different ways to create a pen with a custom label. Surprisingly, the circuit board pen is a custom label pen. Let's take a look at its construction because your choice of casting affects your approach to making a label pen.

The easiest way to make a circuit board pen is to buy it pre-cast in acrylic. For \$11-\$18 at exoticblanks.com, trim the ends, turn and



polish. The blanks come with tubes to fit either a cigar pen or a Sierra/Sierra Vista.

There's also

a kit where the circuit board needs to be glued to the brass tube. The circuit board is precut to fit exactly on the Sierra tube.

That circuit board label doesn't work for every kind of pen kit! That's because the tube length and diameter vary, and therefore the size of your label will vary too!

The equation $C=D\pi$, will work for calculating the width of your label. I found it easier to wrap a Post-It Note around the tube and mark where the seam should be, and measure the distance/ Plus, you don't have to look up that π is equal to 3.14159.

Generally, on your desktop computer, you can "right-click" and "save as" for a logo or graphics from the Web (being mindful of copyright issues). Photoshop or a similar program is useful to size the label. Save it as a .jpg, email it to your phone, and take it to Walgreens to print on photo paper. The print quality is more vibrant and sharper than a laser printer. Also resin will lift and smear laser toner, so don't even go there.) Double stick tape is used to attach the print to the tube, being careful to be square to the tube or your seam won't line up!

There's a couple of ways you can cast your label in acrylic. One approach is to suspend the tube and label in a mold, fill with resin and when it has cured, you can pop it out, trim the ends, turn an polish.



This approach will take you on a journey into a casting which has infinite possibilities for casting creativity.. (Call John Underhill if you want advice and equipment.)

There is a second choice that is worth exploring, the Berea UV Pen Kit

With this kit, you mount the tube on your lather with a pen mandrel and the proper bushings for your pen kit. Squeeze and brush on a layer of resin and cure it with the UV light. It hardens in minutes! Repeat until you have created a pen blank that is larger than your desired diameter. Turn and polish to finish your pen!

It sounds like magic, especially the part where the liquid hardens in minutes. In practice, you discover that it does take some practice. The amount of resin applied is dependent upon how hard you squeeze the tube, how fast you move from left to right, and when you apply the UV light. It does harden in minutes, a final cure in less then 20 minutes.

The better you are at this, the less resing you will use. I think you could get 6 to ten pens made one bottle of resin.

Truing and polishing is exactly the same as an acrylic blank.

The Berea UV Pen Kit is \$39.86 on sale right now for \$35.87 at bereahardwoods.com. It comes with a bottle of resin, the UV light and safety glasses!

For \$40.00, you can expand your penmaking capabilities with some truly unique pens!

Open Shop at the Chicago School of Woodworking

As part of our partnership with the Chicago School of Woodworking, no fee Open Shop Days will continue to be available to the members of the Chicago Woodturners on the last Sunday of the month for the remainder of the year. Open Shop Days provide our members with access to all our shared equipment and tools as well as incidental (or prearranged) mentoring. Each of the Shop Days has a facilitator/mentor on site.

The Chicago Woodturners has six JET 1642s, two JET 1224 mini's and three Powermatic 3520's in a dedicated turning area at the Chicago School of Woodworking. Turning tools are

available, both from the school stock and the Chicago Woodturners lending library. Of course, all members are free to bring whatever tools and wood blanks they choose. Two slow-speed grinders, with a variety of aluminum oxide/CBN wheels and Wolverine Jigs, are available.
