Hands-On Workshop | Elizabeth Weber

















It was a busy week and weekend for Elizabeth Weber, who returned to Chicago from Seattle, to be the featured demonstrator at the November meeting, conduct the Instant Gallery critique as well as run a three day Hands-On Workshop at the Chicago School of Woodworking.

Elizabeth Weber: Coloring, Carving, Wood Burning and Texturing

Elizabeth Weber from Seattle, Washington, was our professional demonstrator for the November meeting. Born in the 1980s, to parents who were both professors of history, she showed early promise in both

mathematics and art. She kept a sketchbook where she accumulated drawings of her

favorite flowers.

Another workshop, this time with Art Liestman, taught her dry brushing. Further workshops with Graeme Priddle and Melissa Engler, as well as Glenn Lucas, rounded out her turning journey. Today she is known for carving spoons and turning lidded boxes and bowls, with all manner of surface embellishments, with emphasis on bright colors.

Following in the footsteps of her parents, she has become an educator, but without a formal

Textured vs. Non-Textured

While she does not hold a formal degree in Art, she is clearly a very talented and creative artist. She ultimately received an M.S. degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. Her early interests were in building

bridges, but she later pivoted to courses in development and infrastructure, working several jobs post-graduation on construction sites in East Tennessee.

In 2012, she and her husband moved to Seattle, Washington, where they purchased a "fixer-upper" home with access to a table saw. Inspired by a friend who produced items on a table saw, Elizabeth developed an interest in making Arts and Crafts furniture in 2015.

In 2018, she took a class in turning "just for fun," but didn't really pursue the craft until about eight months later. Initially, everything she produced on a lathe was round and brown. But after taking a workshop with Donna Zils Banfield who taught carving and texturing, the flame was lit. She started to do rotary carving and bought a woodburner.



academic position. She travels the country extensively, teaching at craft schools and wood turning clubs.

She has also received the

AAW's coveted Professional Outreach Program's Artist Showcase award in 2023. Only two such awards are given annually, usually to a veteran turner of significant accomplishment, or to a particularly promising newcomer.

For turning, her favorite species are cherry, Pacific Northwest madrone, and sycamore. All turn and carve beautifully. She also enjoys using maple and walnut. Her preferred finishes include Golden Archival Varnish. The Satin finish is not overly shiny, and the Matte finish is dead flat. She also likes walnut oil for spoons and bowls.

But to color her pieces, she likes to use milk paint and acrylics. She says, "color is nature's way of smiling." Visit her website www.icosawood.work.com to see examples of her

carved spoons and bowls, all produced in her one-woman shop.

Her favorite carving tools are from Flexcut and Pfiel. Carving gouges are usually designated by two numbers, such as 7-12. The first number indicates the curvature of the gouge; the second number is the flute tip size, usually in mm. The "U" shaped No. 11 is her favorite. The No. 7 doesn't produce as deep a cut as the No. 11. She tries to cut against the grain when possible.

Expect to pay about \$120.00 for a set of Swiss made gouges. One could use a reciprocating carver, but in her experience, it can cause your hand to start to tingle, and you hands get hot when using it. Her advice when carving a texture onto a piece: "Don't leave anything flat."

About 85% of her work is done with a rotary carver. They are noisy, and she started to get a pain in her hand from using one. So she switched to a microcarver, which is not as noisy. The micro-PRO from Mastercarver, which is a handheld rotary carver that accepts a variety of bits, has an adjustable rpm of up to 46,000.

Rotary burrs are used for roughing-out material. A singlecut burr leaves a nice, clean finish. A double-cut burr, which

cuts in two directions, is faster, and offers better operator control. Burrs come in high speed steel (HSS) or carbide. Start with HSS. They're less expensive than carbide.

For a less expensive approach, consider the Marathon MTI Powercarver for about \$175.00. Liz starts with a yellow burr for simple

texturing. She runs them at about 30,000 to 35,000 rpm for stippling.

If you don't want to burn the wood, turn down the rpm. If you're using a ball-shaped bit, don't put too much pressure on it or you can burn out the motor. The most effective cutting technique is to use the burr on its side. Listen to the pitch of the motor. Making light passes multiple times is better than trying to hog out the wood in one pass. For concave or convex surfaces, right-handers will pull the cutter towards them. Lefties will push the cutter away from themselves.

For woodburning, Elizabeth recommends the Burnmaster brand. She likes using the ball tip for stippling. A nichrome



wire insert lasts a long time and can be used for making multiple shapes, as well as straight lines. A stump cutter has a serrated edge which she uses on convex surfaces. She likes to start at the bottom of a bowl. That way, if she makes a mistake, it's at the bottom of the bowl where it is less visible. If you're making vertical lines, wait until the tip turns orange, which means it's really hot. If you're doing stippling with a woodburner, it's a lot slower than a rotary tool. When finished, she uses a brass brush to remove the black, burned wood. And here's a tip for your

workbench setup: Make it with long legs so that you're working at chest level, rather than waist level. It saves your back in the long run.

For applying colors, you can use a base coat of black, white, or green. Then follow up with acrylic colors. Milk paint is also an option. She likes the Old Fashion brand. Use a 1:1 ratio of water to powder. You want to end up with a heavy cream consistency. When painting your

surface, try not to flood your stippling or facets with excessive paint. Milk paint takes about 10 to 20 minutes to dry. And you can layer different colors on top of each other, and then follow up after the paint dries with light sanding with 600 grit sandpaper. If you're impatient, use 320 or 220 grit sandpaper. Elizabeth uses two coats of base coat or transparent, followed by two coats of the final paint.

And finally, if you use acrylics for dry brushing, be sure to use a very small amount of paint on the tip of the brush, which is then used in a vigorous, dusting fashion. Be sure not to overload the brush with paint. For dry brushing, a little paint goes a long way.





Gratitude, not just for a wig stand button

Ever since out of necessity I created a wig stand button (to plug a hole) and called it a gratitude button, I can't seem to escape the word. Everywhere I go, offering gratitude at the Thanksgiving table for friends, family and the food on the table. Offering gratitude that the Bears have a new head coach. Gratitude that we have finally reached the end of a pretty chaotic year.

Practicing gratitude has been shown to help individuals cope with the emotional and psychological challenges. Here are some ways that gratitude can be beneficial:

Emotional Resilience: Gratitude can increase resilience in the face of stress and crisis, helping people to better manage their emotions and maintain a positive outlook.

A gratitude button wasn't a part of the design criteria for the wig stands for the WIT initiative to provide a support for a cancer patient's wig.

Nor was it intentional to have the tailstock leave an indentation on the top of the wig stand. But having one left me with a decision on what to do with it. Make the top smaller, thinner? Patch it with Plastic wood?

The decision was to accentuate it with a piece of cast resin pen blank. It measured 3/4 inch diameter, an exact match for a 3/4 in. Forstner bit. I

used a scroll chuck with pen jaws to shape the end, sanded it and then polished with the microfine, white Yorkshire grit. Part it off and glue with Titebond or CA glue.

Using contrasting woods, a piece of ebony, laser engrave, carve or texture the button are be interesting variations! The feedback from many was that it was a good idea. Maybe it will spawn an entire industry (but you heard it first here!)

The real hope is that it provides a cancer patient with a focus point that helps them through their difficult times.

And how about something for the guys? My cousin just passed away with cancer, I wish I had made him something with a gratitude button.

Bead Bowl/Box Guidelines

Beads of Courage members may receive thousands of beads. It is desirable for your boxes to hold them all. As a result, turned or rectangular lidded boxes need to be large.

- Dimensions:
 - Interior for turned boxes: 6" diameter (5" min.), 5" height (4" min.)
 - Interior for flatwork boxes: 4"x6"x4"
- Base and lids:
 - Box bases should be wide enough so the box is stable and does not tip over easily.
 - Lids for Beads of Courage boxes should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift. Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate so they don't break.
- Design considerations:
 - Avoid excessively elaborate designs that may easily break or be damaged;

The Chicago Woodturners regularly donates \$25 to receive BOC logo beads for you to include anywhere within or outside the box.

Each logo bead comes with a Woodworker Artist card where you can include your personal signature. While these beads are not mandatory, you can appreciate how the beads and cards connect our art with the Beads of Courage mission. Everyone who receives a box or bag also has a personal connection to Chicago Woodturners members.

Finishes:

- Bowls must be safely sealed. Please use a safe finishing process without toxic materials. Bowls that have not been properly sealed can harbor mold which is dangerous to our members with compromised immune systems.
- Do not use finishes like linseed oil or other finishes that take a long time to outgas.
- Refrain from painting the boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, a stain, and/or burning.

If your organization or members might be interested, please let me know.


