

Our demo this month is on Finishing. Rich Nye, Roy Lindley and John Dillon are going to each spend 10-15 minutes telling us what their favorite finish is for different types of wood and applications. Roberto was supposed to be on the panel too, but he had to teach a class down at Marc Adams this week so we let him off the hook. Personally, I tend to use mostly Mahoney's Walnut Oil on the darker woods and either Howard's butcher block oil or Wipe on Poly for the lighter woods. In the Matt Monaco class, we used Mahoney's Walnut Oil to wet sand and then Yorkshire Grit and finished up with a wax. Some folks finish up with the buffing wheel. Lots of options. Get your finishing questions ready.

We have Australian, Simon Begg doing the demo at our June meeting. Remember our June meeting has been moved to June 19, 2025 due to the AAW Symposium starting on our regular meeting night. Simon is going to demo a German ring style of turning. He is also teaching three days of classes on June 20, 21 and 22 at our teaching facility at the Chicago School of



Woodworking. There may be a spot or a day left, but Simon's class filled up quickly.

We have some more silent auction items at the May meeting plus some donated tools that will be in the raffle - along with wood in our raffle. Kurt Wolff-Klammer has been an invaluable Chicago Woodturners member who has already done much for all of us. At our May meeting, he rose to the challenge once more to present a demonstration on constructing his signature mini-bird feeder ornament.

These charming feeders are actually an assembly of five individually turned pieces. Two small bowl shaped

pieces are held together with a connecting stem. Small finials are attached to the top and bottom.

Kurt begins with 1.5 inch blanks cut on a bandsaw to expose small wood blanks cut into end grain squares. Since the ornament requires a top and bottom blanks, begin with at least two. A blank was mounted on the lathe in spindle orientation and turned round at high speed with a bowl gouge. Once round, Kurt turned a small tenon on the top. A shallow bead was then formed using small controlled cuts. Since the grain was presented in endgrain, the cuts were made from the outside toward the center. Once the bead was satisfactory, the blank was reversed and held with a set of Vicmarc long jaws. Note that Kurt's Vicmarc jaws had a small aperture. Vicmarc has since redesigned the long jaws with a much wider aperture. Still, a small tenon can be held by numerous other methods.

The small bowl shaped form was turned flat then hollowed with a bowl gouge from the inside out. A ¼ inch brad point drill bit was used to cut a hole through the top. A small scrap of wood was then placed in the jaws and a ¼ inch tenon formed. It was used to reverse the small bowl, and hold it from the drilled hole. This allowed the bowl's tenon to be cut away and the final shape formed. Kurt mentioned that the same procedure was used earlier to create a nearly identical bowl form.

Kurt then placed a blank about six inches long and a half inch thick into the Vicmarc long jaws.

A ¼ inch tenon was turned on the end of the blank. Kurt used a caliper to measure the shaft portion of the drill bit. He turned a slightly oversized taper on the end. The hole in the bowl was twisted to put a burnished mark on the taper. The burnished

mark identified the exact location to be cut. A curve was turned from the newly formed tenon to the point the next tenon was to be turned. Again, the calipers with the ½ inch measurement were used to cut the tenon on the opposite end. The newly formed spindle was cut off with a fine tooth pull saw. Both bowls were test fit to make sure the newly turned spindle was acceptable.

The crown finial was turned from the same blank as the connecting piece. A classic shape was selected to turn with a small ball on top, a cove, and another ¼ inch tenon. A smaller finial and tenon was turned for the bottom bowl. All pieces were tested for fit.

The stem section was glued to both bowls with Titebond 2 glue. Top and bottom finials were also glued.

Kurt applied some more Titebond to the top face of the bottom bowl. While it was still wet he dipped the ornament into a bag of birdseed and pressed the loose seed into the glue.

UV resin and light were used to secure a tiny Hobby Lobby bird to the seed. A variety pack of twelve birds can be purchased for about \$4.50.

The final touch was to attach a strong wire to the ornament. Kurt uses a Beadalon 7 stainless steel wire for this. Beadalon 7 wire is 0.38 millimeters in diameter and can be easily cut with a fingernail clipper. A micro drill bit was used to drill a 0.8 mm hole in the top finial. The UV resin, UV light, Beadalon wire and micro drill bit are easily obtained online.

Kurt has taught us how to make what is perhaps the most adorable turning that we have seen for a very long time. Now, if you will excuse me, my bird loving wife will give me no rest until I make one for her. Thanks Kurt.

When CWT started talking about doing this event (around 2011), it took Roger Basrak and Arnold Footle several years to convince the organizers of FOCUS that we were a good fit for their event. Once they did, it was obvious from the first class that our rotations were going to be one of the most talked about classes. Each rotation, extra kids would show up to turn a pen. Teachers would show up to turn a pen. Younger siblings showed up to turn a pen. Parents showed up to turn a pen. The principal, more teachers, the organizers. We heard over and over how students would leave the class and show off their pens. It was an excellent experience for all but mostly for the CWT members who volunteered. To see the glow on the faces of these kids as they turned their first pens was a joy for all.

Since that first FOCUS, Members of CWT have been volunteering to teach and demonstrate during this festival of arts. CWT was the first artist group that was ever invited to return for the following FOCUS before the current event was even over. Our members have support this educational outreach wholeheartedly and the students of HPHS have shown their appreciation by filling all of our rotations within hours of being able to register. We've been told "pen turning always fills up first." This year was no different.

It takes a mountain of work to get everything ready and set up to do this event. When Roger Basrak passed, Brenda Miotke inherited the job of coordinator. She says she enjoys giving the introductory speech to each class and hopes she does it half as well as Roger did. Then there are all the folks that help prepare the pen blanks, picking up and setting up the lathes. Checking the tool boxes, preparing the finishes, the sand paper, the paper towels and any number of other items that could easily be forgotten. We have folks who teach, folks who assemble, folks who talk about the instant gallery of wood turned items that we display so the kids

understand that there is more than just pens to be made on the lathe.



The first annual wig stand inter-club competition has concluded and we have a winner!



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Open Shop at the Chicago School of Woodworking


As part of our partnership with the Chicago School of Woodworking, no fee Open Shop Days will continue to be available to the members of the Chicago Woodturners on **the last Sunday of the month, 9:00 am to 3:00 pm**. Open Shop Days provide our members with access to all our shared equipment and tools as well as incidental (or prearranged) mentoring. Each of the Shop Days has a facilitator/mentor on site.

The Chicago Woodturners has six JET 1642s, two JET 1224 mini's and three Powermatic 3520's in a dedicated turning area at the Chicago School of Woodworking. Turning tools are available, both from the school stock and the Chicago Woodturners lending library.





How did you get into wood turning?

One of the struggles of living in an apartment or condo is the minimal opportunity to woodwork. When I bought a house last year and finally had a garage to work in, I jumped in head first. I started by watching woodworking videos on YouTube and decided my first project was to make a starter workbench. Whether purchasing tools & hardware from a big box store or online listings, I found myself wanting to try this and try that. With all the new terminology I was hearing, SO many times in the middle of watching a video or reading, I had to google or search for a video to explain... I felt like such a beginner and out of my element. Eventually, I came across a woodturning video and was enamored. So after some googling, I signed up for Woodworking 101 and Turning 101 at Chicago School of Woodworking for the next sessions classes.

Then I started perusing Facebook Marketplace & Craigslist, looking for a lathe. From some loose guidelines found on the r/turning forum on Reddit, I found a decent condition Jet 1014 and loaded it in the back of the car to take home & set up. I also found some used turning tools online as well. Watching video after video, I started the basic workbench but really wanted some hands on experience with turning (1000+ rpm will do that), so I waited for the class to start.

Walking into the first turning class, I met Andy Kuby & Clint Stevens, and after a review of the equipment & some technique demonstrations, 30 minutes later WE WERE TURNING! It was exciting but also humbling... watching them make these smooth cuts showing us how to do something and then not being able to replicate it. Practice, practice, practice on our end and patience, patience, patience from our wonderful teachers.

If you had asked going into class, initially I would have said I mainly wanted to turn pens. Then after doing multiple different items in class and also seeing what members submitted for the Instant Gallery at the meetings, I wanted to try a little bit of everything.

I'm still working on organizing my home workshop and trying to make time to actually make some shavings. It's been a fun experience to join CWT and see some of the amazing work that other people have done. It's also been great to meet people who have club relationships of 25+ years and also newer people who are just getting started. I'm heading out of state for my first instructional weekend class in the middle of May (maybe a report on that in a future newsletter).

My day job is operations manager for a large family owned sports bar in Chicago, on top of the social aspect of working there I also love data & spreadsheets. I've had an idea that I would like to help lead moving forward for the club...working through the member list and putting surveys out to gather information that could help the interpersonal relationships between members. Whether that is by helping you realize who lives close to you and coordinating a turning day at someone's shop or a project collaboration. Or even by helping people realize who else enjoys turning bowls or pens or chopping down logs for blanks. It's an interesting dynamic within the club where some members turning is a profession, other members have consistently turned for 20+ years, and other members (cough...myself) have less than a year of experience and love learning more.

By putting this out in the newsletter, hopefully will be my motivation to keep my idea moving forward. That being said, you may see a survey or two come out over the next few months, possibly in paper at a meeting or in your email. Would greatly appreciate any effort to participate in those.
