## Beads of Courage Delivery | Andy Kuby

On June 30, 2025, the Chicago Woodturners delivered 13 additional Beads of Courage boxes and over fifty Beads of Courage bags. The Boxes were made by Frank Pagura, Al Miotke and Andy Kuby. The Bags were sewn by Brenda Miotke and Rosemary Pagura. Emily Irwin, Child Life Specialist, accepted the donation on behalf of Lurie Children's



Hospital. The Chicago
Woodturners have been providing Lurie with Beads of Courage boxes for over ten years and is proud to be a partner in this program. The Lurie website describes the program like this:

Sometimes our patients' experiences can't be fully captured in words, so our Beads of Courage

program allows patients to express themselves through arts in medicine. The program helps our patients diagnosed with cancer in the <u>Division of Hematology and Oncology</u> string together beads that provide something tangible to use to tell their unique stories during treatment. It also gives patients a sense of ownership over their experience as well as recognition of the courage displayed in each visit a child makes to the



hospital for treatment.

Beads of Courage is an international program created in response to the need for more supportive care programs for children with serious illnesses. Beads of Courage embraces the different meanings beads have in various cultures while giving patients the opportunity to assign their own meanings to beads. When a child starts the program, they're given a string with their name on it and a few starter beads to begin their story. As time goes on, they receive different beads to mark milestones in their treatment, including: Birthdays, Surgeries, Stem Cell Transplants, Chemotherapy, and Special accomplishments & acts of courage.

At the end of their treatment, all participants receive a purple heart to mark the end of their difficult journey. Like the soldiers returning from the front, our patients have been wounded, but they are also survivors.

The heads serve as a meaningful way to preserve memories of a child's treatment, and they also help give relatives or friends a different perspective of the child's experience.

Our program has enrolled more than 500 patients. It is also available for our Spanish speaking families. Both boys and girls are welcome to participate. Ask your social worker or nurse for more information on the program.

Look for it and all past issues on the AAW's WIT page. Typically Andi chooses a topic for the gallery and there are reports from local clubs, and a couple articles of interest. It's just a great way to see what other clubs are doing around the country so be sure to look for it! You should get an email letting you know it's available, but the AAW database has some issues currently so, be sure to go look for it. 
If you have some extra wood laying around and would be willing to make up some wig stand kits it would be greatly appreciated. Materials for each kit should have the following: Top: 1 1/2"-2" thick x 5" diameter disk, Base: 1 1/2"-2" thick x 6" diameter disk and Stem: 10"-13" x 1.5 x 1.5 spindle block. Any species of dry wood will work for this project. It can be solid or glued up. Thank you in advance for your contributions.

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## Interactive Demo - Simon Begg | Clint Stevens

Legendary science fiction author Arthur C. Clarke once proposed "Any sufficiently advanced technology is indistinguishable from magic." I had never found that statement more relevant then when Simon Begg came to the Chicago Woodturners meeting to demonstrate turning German Rings. If you were not at our June meeting, you have missed a pivotal demonstration this year...let me try to catch you up.

German rings are known as 'Reifendrehen', which translates literally as 'tire turning'. It's a technique of turning a round blank of wood with a specific top and bottom profile. The traditional profile might be a farm animal but could easily be applied to a toy car or even a house. When finished, it can be sliced to reveal a predetermined shape. This has been a staple of generations of German toy makers near the town of Seiffen and continues there to the present day. Modern designs can include botanical motifs, such as leaves and flowers, to exotic animals or local fauna.

A ring turning project begins long before the blank is even mounted on the lathe. The subject should be reduced to a simple black and white profile. Detailed features, such as delicate feathers on the end of a bird's wing, or even deep or undercut areas are not suitable for ring turning.

Simon is a turner who does not need a large number of specialty tools. For our demonstration he simply brought a bowl gouge, spindle gouge, and a skew chisel. Unlike many of us, he does not subscribe to the notion that he is "one tool away from greatness." Since his blanks are side grain oriented (bowl blanks), his primary tool is a bowl gouge. Scrapers or custom cut tools could be useful in hard to reach areas. Simon also uses flat sided skew chisels, but not oval skew chisels. He considers them dangerous. I've never considered them dangerous...but do consider them as evil demonic tools spawned from the bad neighborhoods of the underworld. Also, they are tough to use. Regardless of which tool is used, sharpness is the key to clean cuts. It's much easier to make a cut that needs little or no sanding when your tool is sharp. If there is a question as to whether a tool is appropriate, print a silhouette of the shape to be turned, then place your tool over the print-out to make sure that the desired shapes can be easily cut. The shape that Simon selected for our demonstration was an echidna. Don't worry if you have never seen one, they are egg laying mammals related to the platypus and native to Australia.

In order to help with the cutting process, Simon carefully measured the silhouette and made notes to identify key features. For example, he had the overall height and width of the silhouette along with the location of the tail and the top and bottom of its long snout. This careful measuring is key to Simon's methods. He trued up the blank and then identified where the chuck would hold the ring once it was reversed...for this turning, it was to be held by the front feet by jaws in expansion mode. This allowed Simon to determine the size of the ring and the size of the chuck jaws necessary to hold the ring when it was reversed.

Once the bottom of the animal was turned, Simon was able to reverse the blank so that it was held in its predetermined position. This is where the careful measuring of the silhouette of the echidna served as a guide to allow Simon to precisely cut the top half of the animal. Once cut, Simon laid the ring out along the spindle grain and sawed it in half. The expected echidna shape matched the silhouette perfectly.

As I mentioned earlier, this was like knowing how the magic trick was done and still not believing your eyes. Simon had amazed and convinced a roomful of somewhat skeptical wood turners. He made a lot of friends that night and we are definitely looking forward to meeting him down the twisty wood turning road.

Many people are members of both clubs but there is a significant difference in membership #'s (CWT has over 150 members & WCWT has just over 75 members...but a very mighty group). The two club President's agreed to take the challenge for bragging rights to see which club could produce more wig stands in 2 months. This was a big motivator for members! Windy City won by 2 wig stands. We have a 3rd woodturning club (Illiana / South Suburban Woodturners) that were not included in the initial challenge...plus a couple of woodworking clubs that could help in this effort. 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## **SAFETY REPORT - July 2025** | Frank Pagura

CWT has gladly signed up several new beginning turners this year, so I thought it would be fitting to revisit some basic safety practices that could be beneficial for New Turners starting out on this beautiful adventure. I am sure it wont hurt to remind our well-seasoned members that being safe is a never ending responsibility for us all.

- 1) PREPARING THE BLANK Inspect the blank for cracks, splits, bark inclusions and flaws. Remove lose bark that could fly off when the blank is spun at high speed.
- 2) MOUNTING THE BLANK Select the most appropriate method to mount your blank on the lathe. You have several options, considering blank size and type of wood. Tenon for a chuck, flange with screws, in between centers etc.
- 3) USE YOUR LIVE CENTER Form a habit to use your live center, whenever possible.
- 4) CHECK ALL YOUR LOCKING LEVERS Tighten securely the chuck, the banjo and tool rest, and the tail stock. Remember that these may come lose while turning and should be rechecked often.
- 5) ROTATE THE BLANK TO MAKE SURE IT IS CLEAR -

Rotate the blank by hand to make sure it clears the tool rest. Start your lathe at the slowest speed, bring up to working speed checking for unusual vibrations caused by potential blank out of balance or improper mounting.

- 6) STAY OUT OF THE LINE OF FIRE This is a good time to remember to stay out of the line of fire, the most likely trajectory the blank or pieces thereof will travel if suddenly they are catapulted by the spinning lathe.
- 7) SELECT THE PROPER TOOL FOR THE JOB There are some do's and don'ts here, such as using a roughing gouge inside a bowl, or using a skew before you are ready. Use sharp tools, most of all, there is no shame in using a scraper at the beginning. Sharpen tool often. Bring tool rest as close as possible, do not overhang your tool excessively. With practice and experience it will be easier to use the variety of tools available to modern day turners.
- 8) WEAR EYE AND FACE PROTECTION, ALWAYS Safety glasses, a full-face shield is highly recommended
- 9) BE MINDFUL OF LUNG PROTECTION. Breathing in wood dust can lead to serious consequences over time. At the least it is safer if you use an N95 dust mask, especially when sanding. Dust collection is a reasonably expensive proposition, but in the long run it will be your most valuable investment if you plan to peruse woodturning. Getting a little help from a mentor to learn what is available to keep you a safe and happy turner is recommended.



- 10) YOUR ATTIRE CAN LEAD TO TROUBLES Long lose sleeves and lose fitting gloves are discouraged, anything dangling, like sweatshirts tie strings should be tucked away. A turning smock serves the purpose well, protecting from flying shavings as well as covering lose clothing items. The same applies to long hair, rings and jewelry. It is also recommended that paper towel be used to apply finishes to a rotating part A cloth rag can easily be trapped by the rotating piece.
- 11) ADEQUATE ILLUMINATION Operating sharp tools requires the ability to see well. If you lack the depth perception you are prone to have catches more often. Invest in the best lighting you can afford, it will go a long way in making you a safer turner and help eliminate fatigue.
- 12) USE THE A-B-C RULE OF TURNING ANCHOR, then BEVEL, then CUT. Anchor your tool on the tool rest. Rub the tool bevel on the blank. Slowly adjust until the sharp edge starts cutting.
- 13) THE STANCE AT THE LATHE First of all, the space for your stance at the lathe should be clean and clear of tripping hazards (like extension cords and rubbish). Your stance should be with your feel well planted and balanced. Move your upper body to guide the cutting tool through its path. We repeat take a position that keeps your body away from a line of fire.
- 14) IF YOU HAVE A DOUBT <ACT ON IT> At the lathe, if you hear an unusual noise or see excessive vibrations, stop and investigate. If you are unsure about a procedure, and you feel it is beyond your present capabilities call for help. CWT has a list of mentors who will know the answer, or they can direct you to a safe resolution.

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

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## Last Cut - Ellsworth Class & Legacy Project | Big Country

Sadly, David Ellsworth passed away on June 16th. I had the opportunity to take his class in May and it was an amazing experience. Wishing his family the best as they work through this tough time. Before his passing, the AAW was already working on the David Ellsworth Legacy Project (DELP), an in-depth book on his life & art. I've signed up with the group as a volunteer to share information on the book with the club when the time comes.

I started wood turning in September 2024 by taking turning classes at the Chicago School of Woodworking, that were taught by members of the Chicago Woodturners. After working through the 101 and 102 classes and buying my ticket to my first international symposium, I started looking for a class to take. Though I reached out in January, I was the last person accepted into his May 2025 class in Weaverville. The class was amazing & I was blown away by the amount of amazing art around his home & in his studio (David's pieces as well as others). His wife Wendy & his assistant Charlie were wonderful during the class as well.

My 1st favorite moment was working up the courage to ask him

on the 3rd day when we were in shop, "Could you share how exactly you came up with your idea for hollowing tools? Was it a project or an idea..." and I trailed off. David got this wry smile on his face & stood up from his chair in the garage workshop and asked me to follow him into his gallery. He flicked on the lights and immediately went



over to one of the middle shelves on the wall to the right of the door, picked up a finished piece that looked like a squat (wider than tall) hollow form, and started telling the story about it. David said "This was the piece that inspired it...I had planed the top to get this other piece of wood fitted in. Then when I had that connected, I wanted to hollow out the inside but didn't have any tools that could accomplish that...so I made some". He then turned the piece over and I could see the "Ellsworth '76" signature and I mentioned that I was negative 6 years old when he made that:)



My 2nd favorite moment was during the morning of the 3rd and final day of class. My brain was already feeling overloaded at the experience and knowledge that I was trying to soak in. Cup of coffee in hand, the group of students was sitting around David's living room telling stories & asking questions. When turning my first hollow form ever the day before, I was at the final stages & I exploded the top off of it. As the owner of what most would call a sailor's mouth, I definitely let a few fly after that happened. During the week, I had maybe heard a 'hell' or 'damn' come from David or any of the others in the group over the first two days. This morning, one of the other classmates had complimented David on his pieces & was telling a story to the group about exploding a hollow form bowl at home. A slow smile came across David's face as the story ended and he said "Don't worry about that happening...I can fuck up a piece just as good as anyone else". That made me laugh & feel better about the previous day's hollow-form mishap.

David showed us the piece he was sending to the AAW National Symposium the next month. For a hollow-form that was at least a foot tall, picking it up and feeling the lightness of the piece was amazing. He did mention he wouldn't be making the trip this year but told us to have fun. Seeing that same piece at the live auction was a moment of happiness, only to be filled in later that he had been placed in hospice then receiving the sad news flying home.


